BURNS MAY BE FATAL

MRS. CHARLES SCHLICHTING TERRIBLY INJURED BY AN EXPLOSION OF GASOLINE

WAS ENVELOPED IN FLAMES

Too Much Oil Was Allowed to Enter the Cups of a Gasoline Stove at Which the Injured Lady's Sister Was at Work - Fire Communicated to Can of Oil Which Mrs. Schlichting Tried to Remove.

Mrs. Charles Schlichting, living at 1601 East Seventh street, was, perhaps, fatally burned by gasoline shortly after 6 o'clock yesterday morning. Her face was charred by the flames, while both hands and arms are badly burned. About the chest Mrs. Schlichting also sustained severe burns and both limbs are blistered to the hips.

The indications are that she also inhaled some of the flames. Dr. Binder, who is attending the unfortunate woman, says he hopes to save her life, but that the shock and inhalation of fire may prove fatal.

The accident happened at Mrs. Schlichting's home before breakfast yesterday morning. She was in the yard assisting her husband, who conducts a dairy, in milking. Miss Schlichting, the injured woman's sister-in-law, was preparing the morning meal. In filling the gasoline stove Miss Schlichting allowed too much oil to enter the cups. When the oil was lighted the flames burst forth and the oil that had run onto the floor caught fire. Miss Schlichting ran into the yard, calling for help, and Mrs. Schlichting hurried into the house. A five-gallon can of gasoline stood close to the stove. Mrs. Schlichting had already reached it. Mrs. Schlichting grabbed the can to throw it out the door. As she did so a volume of flame shot from the opening of the can into her face. It was not an explosion but a sudden puff of fire. The blaze struck Mrs. Schlichting full in the face. She was overcome by the fire and fell to the floor, dropping the blazing can. In an instant she was completely surrounded by fire. Mr. Schlichting ran into the house, and a member of the fire department sought to rescue her. Rushing into the fire he seized her about the waist and half carried, half dragged her out of the burning room, and then she was taken to the hospital.
