MILWAUKEE COMPLETES A SURVEY FROM ST. PAUL TO DULUTH

IS GOING TO BUILD AT ONCE

The Road Will Be One Hundred and Sixty Miles Between Terminals—News of the Tender of the Position to A. L. Mohler by the Big Four Causes Considerable Interest in Local Circles.

DULUTH, Minn., July 19.—W. H. Sheldon, locating engineer for the Chicago, Duluth & St. Paul railway, stated today that surveys for a line by that road from the twin cities to Duluth have been completed; that the road would be finished by a year from the coming fall and that estimates of its cost are not to exceed \$3,000,000, or about \$20,000 per mile.

The line is about 160 miles between terminals. From St. Paul it follows up the general course of the St. Paul & Duluth as far as Rush City. It touches Hinckley, trends easterly to Sandstone and follows the course of the Eastern Minnesota from there north. Surveyors have been working on the line nearly a year and have now been called in.

The estimates are prepared and it is expected bids will be called for in the next sixty days. No further attempt will be made by the company to secure the St. Paul & Duluth road, if indeed any such plan has been under way in the past.

OMAHA CROP REPORT

Corn Will Be Heavy Along Certain Parts of the Line.

The Omaha yesterday issued a crop report covering the past two weeks in territory traversed by their lines. It shows that wheat and corn will be a very good crop in Wisconsin, barley, oats and rye being in fine condition also, but with small acreage. On the line of the St. Paul & Sioux City, the corn is a heavy crop, with wheat progressing favorably and with promise of good yields. Damage to standing grain is reported near Mankato and St. James, where recent storms have done a great deal of damage to the crop. The yield in this region will be unusually heavy and of fine quality.

Chinch bugs are reported from Mondak, Wis., where they have appeared in great numbers. The damage to corn is not great. Rye is being harvested in many localities, and with the exception of certain portions of the crop, the yield is throughout Wisconsin, flax shows a light acreage.

Standing grain is filling and maturing rapidly and there is every indication that the crops this year will be fully as good as in many places better than those of last year.

MR. MOHLER'S CHANGE

Report That He Goes With the Big Four Causes Interest.

Considerable interest was aroused yesterday in St. Paul railroad circles by a report from New York that A. L. Mohler, president of the Oregon Navigation & Railway company, had been offered the presidency of the Big Four. Private advices confirm the press dispatch announcing the change. Mr. Mohler is well known in St. Paul, and was connected with the Manitoba railroad from 1883 to 1888, before consolidating and becoming part of the Great Northern. He was connected with the Burlington, Cedar Rapids & Northern for eleven years before coming to St. Paul, where he is connected with the Oregon Railroad & Navigation as general manager of the Minneapolis & St. Louis. The presidency of the Big Four is considered one of the most responsible positions in railroad circles of the Middle West.

GOSSIP ABOUT T. B. LYNCH

Report That He Is to Leave Not Officially Confirmed.

The announcement that T. B. Lynch, assistant general passenger agent of the Great Northern, will leave that road to go with the Cotton Belt, meets with approval among railroad men of the city. Mr. Lynch will say nothing regarding the change to be made, either prior to leaving or after he has taken up his new position. An official familiar with the situation stated yesterday, however, that an offer had been made, which is now under consideration. At the Great Northern general offices the announcement of the coming change provoked much interest. Mr. Lynch is regarded as one of the best men in the city, and the Great Northern will not welcome the change.

Freight Tariff Conference

WASHINGTON, July 19.—The interstate commerce commission will hold a meeting Friday to consider the effect of the proposed change in freight tariffs. The recent reports announce a great improvement in the tariff schedules have not yet been filed with the commission. The Western territory will hold a session at Chicago on Aug. 8, to consider the general situation.
