URGENT DEMAND FOR HARVEST HANDS ALL OVER THE NORTHWEST

No Such Lack of Help Has Been Experienced During the Past Ten Years—Southern Central Minnesota Reports Indicate a Fair Crop Average, With Wheat a Good Stand and Corn Falling Off.

The farmers of North Dakota and the Montana wheat belt are very anxious over the scarcity of harvest hands.

The Northern Pacific and Great Northern general offices are receiving urgent demands for help and reports which have come in during the past two days show that throughout the entire state, North Dakota will be seriously handicapped unless additional men can be secured.

The reports indicate that 25,000 men can find employment in the harvest fields of Montana, North and South Dakota and Western Minnesota.
