NOT UNTIL OCTOBER

THIRTEENTH REGIMENT WILL NOT COME HOME AS SOON AS EXPECTED

CHANGES IN THE REGIMENT

Table of Compensation and Travel Pay for Each Grade of Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Enlisted Men - The Amount Much Larger Than Had Been Anticipated - Think Otis Will Retire.

With the multiplicity of statements made by the war department as to the status of the Thirteenth regiment, the relatives and friends of the Thirteenth regiment are almost as much at sea as to the date when the Minnesota soldier boys will set foot on the thresholds of their own homes as they were a month ago.

From plain, straight conversation with army men, it is safe to say that the Thirteenth Minnesota regiment will not reach St. Paul and Minneapolis before October, and possibly not as soon as that.

The latest dispatches from the war department state that the transport Sheridan, on which the Minnesotans are to return, is at Manila, and will set sail as soon as it can be unloaded, coaled and the regiment marched on board.

Allowing for favorable return passage she will reach the Pacific coast not before the second week in September. Now, it may be stated without fear of contradiction that the balance of September will be consumed in the task of mustering the organization out of the service of the government.

It is not generally understood, but it is relevant in this connection to state that it required three weeks to muster out of the service the Fifteenth Minnesota, which only got as far as Camp Thomas, in Georgia, which never reached the front, and which, consequently, lost no man in battle, necessitating changes and promotions.

Out of nearly 1,300 officers and men who set sail on the City of Para and went later as recruits, but 1,165 will return, according to the latest reports received from Adj. Gen. Corbin. The deaths in battle and from disease and the discharges granted, permitted promotions and necessitated changes in the muster roll of the regiment. All this and the necessity for great care in making up a record to stand for pension cases will call for the greatest accuracy on the part of the mustering out officers.

The above information is the consensus of opinion of most of the army men in St. Paul who could be consulted, and may be considered as a basis for any plans now being made for the reception of the returning men. The committee on the situation and are perfecting their plans accordingly. The details, of course, remain to be arranged.

WHAT THEY WILL RECEIVE. In this connection it may be interesting to know something of the remuneration made by the government to the Minnesota regiment, and a table prepared by Gen. C. F. Purser shows a computation of travel pay for each grade of officer, non-commissioned officer and enlisted man from San Francisco to St. Paul, the shortest route is 2,769 miles, and equal to 108 days, according to government allowance. The figures are as follows:

Judge Lewis, in the district court yesterday, filed a decision in favor of the plaintiff in the action brought for divorce by Louisa Fischer against her husband, Franz Fischer, a piano teacher, living at 725 Martin street.

The defendant, who is the owner of the house on Martin street, where his wife resides, is directed to pay to the plaintiff \$100 as alimony and attorney's fees and \$15 per month on behalf of the children. The court finds that he is a strong and healthy man, capable of averting about \$50 per month at his profession.
