ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND. Number of Men Said to Be Needed to Conquer Philippines. SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—An officer of one of the volunteer regiments in the Philippines has written the following letter: "Manila, June 27.—The arrival of the rainy season finds the insurrection as vigorous as it has been any time since the outbreak. The insurgent armies are well recruited, notwithstanding their heavy losses, and are well fed and clothed. They have profited by their five months of warfare against the Americans. They are fast becoming better disciplined and more skillful in the use of their weapons every day. One out of every three soldiers should be here, ready for business, by the beginning of the dry season in November. Gunshots could then be as common as strategic points. A continuous warfare cannot be carried on in the insurrectionary territory by the same troops. Frequent reliefs are necessary. Troops should not be kept here longer than necessary. The insurrectionary climate retain their native vigor for six or eight months after arriving here, and then begin to succumb to the various ailments of tropical weather. This is exemplified in the cases of the volunteers from the Philippines since last summer. The most of them are saturated with malaria, and are greatly debilitated. They are unfit for further duty, and recuperate in the States. It is likely to be with their successors. The insurrectionary climate is as highly civilized as the twelve million of Mexico."

DEATH OF AN AERONAUT. Fell Three Thousand Feet Into a Lake and Was Drowned. COBY, Pa., July 31.—Frank Reynolds, of Ripley, Adams county, fell 3,000 feet to his death today. The Findlay's Lake assembly opened at Findlay lake, fifteen miles from this city. Reynolds had engaged a party of about twenty authorities to make a balloon ascension and parachute jump. Reynolds, who is twenty-five years of age, and has a wife and child, was said to have been inexperienced before. He had made but one ascension before, and had never jumped with a parachute. Preparations were made and at 10:30 this afternoon the balloon was inflated to the limit. The wind was blowing in strong from Lake Erie, eight miles north. The assembly grounders at Ripley were on the shore of the little lake. The wind was certain to drive the balloon over the lake. It promised to be a dangerous drop for a seasoned veteran, but Reynolds, the novice, never faltered. An immense crowd was present.

BOTH DEAD SHOTS. Family Feud in Kentucky Ends in Fatal Duel. KNOXVILLE, Tenn., July 31.—A fatal duel played across the line in Letcher county, Kentucky. William Smallwood, the younger man, was himself fatally wounded by his uncle. A recent quarrel revived the enmity of two years like a stone. The nearest boat was yet 200 feet up. The lake is being dragged tonight, but up to a late hour no trace of the body had been secured.
