

TRADE OUTLOOK GOOD

THAT IS THE OPINION EXPRESSED BY BRADSTREET'S IN WEEKLY REVIEW

FALL DEMAND IS EXPANDING

Aggressive Strength and Firmness Is Noted in Iron and Steel, Particularly at Central Eastern Markets—Wheat Has Ruled Firm All the Week—Strong Features Developed in General Situation.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—Bradstreet's tomorrow will say: Strength in prices and steadiness of demand are still the salient features of the trade situation. Iron, steel and other metals, most of the cereals, leather and cotton goods manifest upward tendencies as to prices. Other staples, with the exception of sugar and articles that retain all their old firmness, fall demand is expanding at most markets, particularly good reports being received from the Northwest and that portion of the corn growing country which this year seems likely to be notable for surplus production.

Aggressive strength and firmness is noted in iron and steel, particularly at central Western markets. Consideration of next year's needs now seems to be the most prominent feature of the trade aside from complaints of slow deliveries on near-by orders.

Among the cereals wheat has been quite firm all the week, partly owing to a whitening down of Northwestern estimates, but also due to steady demand for the cash article, alike on foreign and domestic account. The relative scarcity of cash corn is responsible for the advance shown this week in the face of a concededly large production.

Conditions of supply and demand seem to be at the bottom of the recent rise in beef prices. This advance has attracted increased receipts of grass-fed cattle, and some shading of prices is to be expected. Chicago prices have only been equalled five times in twenty-two years. There are nearly 10,000 less beef cattle in the country than there were in 1882, and, in fact, there are fewer cattle in the country now than in any year since 1882.

Reflection of the smaller supply of hides and of the advance in prices for the same is found in higher quotations for hemlock sole leather at some markets. Wheat, including flour, shipments for the week aggregated 3,225,782 bushels, against 4,000,000 bushels last week; 3,563,476 bushels in the corresponding week of 1898, 5,149,633 bushels in 1897, 3,281,854 bushels in 1896 and 1,871,828 bushels in 1895. Since July 1 this season the exports of wheat aggregate 2,696,894 bushels, against 2,360,562 bushels last year and 2,562,999 bushels in 1898 and 1,871,828 bushels in 1895. Since July 1 this season corn exports aggregate 37,123,048 bushels, against 27,577,283 bushels during the same period in 1898 and 22,348,295 bushels in 1898-99.
