WAS THE PA PER ORGATES THEIR ADVERTISING VALUE PRECIPITATES THE COUNCIL INTO LIVELY CONTEST. BIDDERS TALK OF FIGHTING. "Meet Me Outside," Was the Tenor of an Excited Dialogue Between the Rivals—Another Change Asked in the Order for Paving on Eagle Street—Market Matter Laid Over.

There was a lively jangle at the meeting of the aldermanic committee on yesterday afternoon between Patrick D. Scannell and St. Clair, who are business rivals for a franchise which will allow the placing of waste paper boxes on the street corners throughout the city. St. Clair presented to the board of aldermen meeting held July 14 an ordinance granting him the exclusive franchise to erect waste paper boxes on the street corners and agreed to give the city 15 per cent of the income from the placing of advertisements on the boxes for the privilege. At the subsequent meeting P. D. Scannell and Frederick C. Schiffmann, organized for business as the St. Paul Clean Street company, also presented an ordinance asking for the privilege for a term of ten years and agreed to pay 15 per cent of the income from advertisements into the city treasury. Several other parties also handed in ordinances and all were referred to the committee on streets. At the last meeting of the board of aldermen A. J. Stobbar presented a substitute ordinance on behalf of St. Clair, agreeing to give 13-1-3 per cent of the gross income from advertising providing he was granted the right.

When the waste paper box business was reached at the committee meeting yesterday afternoon W. H. McDonald, representing St. Clair, made a talk as to the reasons for the franchise being granted to St. Clair. McDonald claimed that St. Clair was the first one in the field and that the firm of Scannell & Schiffmann had only introduced the ordinance granting them the franchise after an agreement had been made and broken between Scannell, St. Clair and F. W. Dempsey in which the trio were to share and share alike in the business. This agreement, Mr. McDonald said, was drawn up by L. J. Dobner and then the ordinance first introduced by St. Clair presented to the board of aldermen. After the ordinance had been hung up by Scannell & Schiffmann would introduce an ordinance and shut him out altogether. The scheme originated, Mr. McDonald said, with F. W. Dempsey, whose name the boxes well known. McDonald said, however, that the ordinance was introduced by St. Clair and that he had no part in it. He said that he had been charged with the ordinance, but this was not so; that he was a gentleman and not a politician. Scannell and St. Clair both talked loudly and charged each other with various crimes. St. Clair said he would meet Scannell outside and the second ward politician agreed that the outside would be the best place to have the fight. Scannell, however, was restored by Aid. Shepard, who was chairman of the meeting. Aid. Blomquist suggested that all the ordinances relating to the franchise be laid over until the next meeting. Aid. Murphy favored the matter being disposed of at once. Aid. Blomquist wanted the last ordinance, that of St. Clair, to be passed. The ordinance, however, was not passed.

The proposed vacation of Grace street, from Pleasant avenue to Victoria street, was laid over. A petition of the property owners asking that the present street on the north side of the tracks of the Milwaukee road be vacated and a street opened on the south side of the tracks. The petition signed by the property owners interested called for a sixty-foot street, but since the petition was circulated arrangements had been made between the owners and the Milwaukee railway officials by which the new street is to be but thirty-six feet wide and the company is to pay for the grading of the street. The petition also raised the point that the change in the width of the street from sixty to thirty-six feet made the petition worthless and a new one would have to be secured in order to make the vacation valid. E. T. Slayton, who has for the past two years interested himself in securing the vacation of the street, said that the present street was laid over and an effort will be made to secure the opening of the new street and then follow this by a vacation of the present one.

The resolution directing the mayor to prevent the erection of poles and wires on any of the streets for telegraph or telephone lines in the territory covered by the conduit ordinance was recommended to pass. The report of the special joint committee on a market site was laid over until the next regular meeting of the committee. ARCHBISHOP AT MASS. He Will Conduct the Opening Service for the Central Societies. It is expected that there will be 20,000 visitors in the city tomorrow in connection with the opening of the convent of the German Catholic Central Society of America and the Catholic German-American Young Men's societies. Aid from the general concert to be given at the Auditorium tomorrow evening, the full programme for which was published in the Globe of yesterday, there will be a high mass at Assumption church, Ninth and Franklin streets, in the forenoon, conducted by Archbishop Ireland, and in the afternoon an immense parade of Catholic societies. All members of A. O. H. divisions in the city are requested to meet at the hall Sunday afternoon, 7 P. M. to participate in the parade of the German Catholic societies. Visitors to the city who are members of the order are also invited to join in the procession as guests of the local divisions. Monday will begin the business sessions of the Catholic Central society, and the Young Men's German Catholic Central society will hold their regular meeting. The latter organization will meet in the general hall at the state capitol. The general hall at the state capitol. The convention will adjourn Thursday. RABIES SUSPECTS IMPROVE. IN AN ENDLESS SLEEP. POISON SIGMUND H. SMALL TOOK FOR RELIEF FROM PAIN KILLED HIM. MEDICAL AID WAS TOO LATE. He Had Been a Sufferer From Insomnia, and Was in a Weak and Debilitated Condition, So That the Drug Produced Unusual Effects in His Case—Funeral Will Be Held Tomorrow.

Sigmund H. Small, the cigar dealer, whose nervousness to sleep was a torment for many years, died at an early hour yesterday morning at St. Joseph's hospital, to which place he was removed at the instance of Dr. J. H. Murphy. Mr. Small was taken to the hospital from the Ryan hotel bath rooms, where he was found by Louis K. Newman, cashier at Mannheim Bros., about 8 o'clock Thursday evening. At that time he was sleeping, and evidently, under the effects of some drug. Horner Debach, proprietor of the bath rooms, asked regarding the circumstances of Mr. Small's visit, said: "Mr. Small came in about half past 12 and was attended by Charles Nyberg. After taking a Turkish bath, he called for a glass of water and put two powders, which he brought with him, in it and drank it. He said, 'Don't wake me up, I want to sleep. I haven't slept for a week.' He was taken to the hospital at that time, and about half past 7 or a quarter to 8 Mr. Newman, the cashier at Mannheim Bros., came in and asked if Mr. Small was there. We told him he was, and that he had asked not to be disturbed. Mr. Newman said he was wanted and must be awakened. "Mr. Newman went to the cot where Mr. Small was sleeping and slapped him on the back and said, 'Get up, there.' His countenance was white as a sheet, and he was on his feet in the evening, and came and tried to help him. Neither of them could wake him. Then they tried an electric battery without success, and finally went out for a doctor. He did not come back for about half an hour and when he brought Dr. Murphy with him, Dr. Murphy said the best place for Mr. Small was at the hospital and the ambulance was sent for and took him away about half past 9."

Mr. Small had been a sufferer from insomnia for a long period, having been afflicted with nervous prostration for these ailments had their origin in a runaway accident. With his wife and children he was out riding. The horse ran away and all members of the family were thrown out. Small was the only one seriously hurt, the injuries that he received confining him to his home for several weeks. He was sent under the care of a physician. Mr. Small had a prosperous business at Fourth and Robert streets, and was fairly well known in business circles throughout the city. He leaves a wife and two young children, both boys. Mrs. Small was summoned to the hospital at a late hour and she was unable to get to the hospital on the suggestion of the hospital people that Mr. Small would no doubt revive later, but he did not regain consciousness. The body was removed to McCarthy & Donnelly's undertaking room and Coroner Nelson summoned, but that official, after inquiry, determined not to investigate the death further than to accept of the death certificate of Dr. Murphy, who was with the patient when he died. He said yesterday: "Small was caused from an overdose of salina. I have taken it for twenty years. In this case the patient had not taken over ten or fifteen grains, but he had just taken a Turkish bath, and he was very hot. The effects of the bath, and the stimulant had a toxic effect upon him. All that could be done was to save the man's life. His treatment at the hands of Dr. Murphy was the best that could be given. The funeral of Mr. Small will be held from his residence, 324 Selby avenue, tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. The pallbearers will be William W. Bergman, Fred Bleiberg, David Bergman, H. B. Farwell and A. Neuru Jr. REFERRED TO BIGELOW. County Attorney Asked as to the Validity of Special School Tax. The question of including the mill and a half special levy for the school fund provided for by the last legislature in the general levy was yesterday referred by County Auditor Johnson to the county attorney, Fred Bigelow, for his opinion. In regard to the matter County Auditor Johnson said yesterday: "I have just received a letter from the city clerk requesting me to extend against the taxable property of the county a levy for the purpose of raising \$112,000 independently of any other sum raised and for school purposes. I have immediately addressed a letter to the county attorney calling his attention to the fact that I was asked for this to be raised independently of any other sum raised under the system in vogue by the county. In view of the fact that the corporation attorney has expressed a doubt as to the constitutionality of the law providing for the raising of one and a half per cent on the general tax, I have requested the attorney to consult the attorney general on the question and advise me. Personally I am in favor of giving everything I can for the schools, but should be advised differently I should feel compelled to immediately notify the council. That will not necessarily end the matter because the council may amend and the question be decided in court. "The school board will no doubt contest it. TO GREET THE THIRTEENTH. City Will Contribute \$500 to the Expense. At a meeting of the joint committee on ways and means held yesterday noon at the mayor's office it was decided to appropriate \$500 from the emergency fund for the reception and entertainment of the Thirteenth regiment on its return to St. Paul. HELD UP THEIR SALARIES. AUGUST PAY ROLL OF THE CITY BUILDING INSPECTION DEPARTMENT. Comptroller McCarty Refused to Sign the Warrants Because of the Depleted Condition of Funds of the Department. There was weeping and wailing figuratively speaking around the office of the building inspector yesterday. When the inspector and his assistants walked into the office of the city clerk yesterday morning and asked for the warrants for their August pay it was discovered that each of the warrants was lacking the signature of Comptroller McCarty, which under the law makes them negotiable with the city treasurer for the money. Across the face of each of the six warrants for the inspector and his five assistants was written in red ink, "Not sufficient money in the fund." The total amount of the warrants is \$58,666 and inquiry at the office of the comptroller brought out the fact that only a little over \$900 was in the fund to meet the warrants. Hence they would not be issued. Comptroller McCarty said, "There was nothing much to say about the matter. The tax estimate for this year allowed the building inspector's department for the month of August a salary of \$8,200, of which \$2,500 was for the inspector and \$5,700 for clerk hire. \$750 for back salary due the inspector for 1898 and \$100 for incidental expenses. Under the charter but 80 per cent of this amount was to be raised by the sale of tax levy certificates of indebtedness, the balance of the total amount designated for the department having to come in from tax collectors. The amount of the monthly certificate of indebtedness was \$5,800 and from tax receipts to date \$214.50. All of the money in the fund with the exception of about \$300 had been paid out on third party salaries during the past seven months and there would be nothing more credited to the fund until there were additional tax receipts. 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
