Advances have been received from 121 congressmen and United States senators of their intention to take the trip to the heart of Minnesota prairie. It is believed that within six months congress will set aside the described district on the Indian reservation as a great state park, comprising 1,500 square miles.

SOLDIERS OF THE THIRTEENTH RE-ENLISTED IN THE PHILIPPINES. ADJUTANT FALK REPORTS MOVEMENTS OF THE THIRTEENTH SINCE JULY 1 ARE OFFICIALLY REPORTED, AND THE GENERAL HEALTH OF THE COMMAND IS SAID TO BE GOOD—NONE OF THE OFFICERS OF THE REGIMENT SICK.

Lieut. Col. Francis Baesen, assistant adjutant general, yesterday received a report from Adjutant E. G. Falk, of the Thirteenth regiment, covering the months of July and August. The report was made out at sea, and gives a very complete record of all the absent enlisted men, as well as changes that have been made since the last report made in July.

There was a raise yesterday of from 10 to 15 per cent in the returns made upon household goods, and there was a constant firing all day yesterday, the mere skirmish compared with yesterday's session.

As there was no basis for household furniture except the returns of the year before, and nearly every member of the board of assessors had a share in it, it required the entire day to dispose of the one item. Some got what they wanted, others did not. The total returned by all the assessors was \$1,182,323, as against \$1,024,454 a year ago.

Ramsey county was given a raise of 20 per cent on returns made, showing a total valuation of \$1,379,752. Hennepin county was pushed up 10 per cent, and there it is said that \$2,238,000 represents the household goods owned principally in Minneapolis.
