LEFT ONE FOR DEAD

GANG OF THIEVES ASSAULT AND ROB TWO FARM HANDS ON FOURTH STREET

THREE SUSPECTS ARRESTED

Michael and John Stewart and John Doyle Are Taken Into Custody—Mike Has Two Knife Wounds Under the Left Shoulder, but Says He Knows Nothing of the Robbery.

Incited by motives of robbery a gang of five thugs made a murderous assault upon Charles Gohde and Wenzel Scheerer, near the Fourth street "tunnel" early last evening, stabbing one of their victims with a knife, while both Gohde and Scheerer were pounded and kicked into partial insensibility.

The victims of the robbery are two country boys who have been harvesting in North Dakota. With their savings they were on their way back to their home at Alma Center, Wis. This is the second time they have been robbed since they went west, as highwaymen held them up at Fargo and took \$40 from them before they found work in the harvest fields.

The young fellows reached the city yesterday afternoon, and seeing the slighter of the tunnel they went to a saloon at Third and Commercial streets. Shortly after 8 o'clock last evening they left the saloon and started over the Third street bridge. When half way across, they say, three men attacked them, demanding their money. The young fellows got away, they say, and ran back to Commercial street. Then they started for the more thickly settled part of the city by way of the Fourth street tunnel.

When near the tunnel they were suddenly pounced upon again by the three men that tried to hold them up on the bridge and two other highwaymen. Both boys made a desperate resistance, but, badly frightened and so outnumbered, they were no match for their assailants, who used clubs and knives in the attack. Gohde stood off the robbers better than his companion and consequently received the worst treatment. He was stabbed twice in the head and received two blows from some blunt instrument that laid open his scalp, while his face and neck were bruised and scratched where he was kicked after being finally knocked down. Scheerer was also beaten and kicked into insensibility. While the fight was going on the young fellows cried loudly for help, but there seems to have been no assistance at hand, for the robbers were not frightened away and took their own time at searching their victims.

That the robbers knew something of holding up farm hands returning from the harvest fields was evidenced by their search. They went through each of the young men's pockets, and in the case of Scheerer removed his clothing, searching his undershirts, and even took off his shoes and stockings, hoping to find the hiding place of the money.

After the highwaymen had beaten him into unconsciousness, the robbers stepped upon the victim could not call for help. The first police knew of the desperate fight that had taken place near the tunnel was when Gohde, covered with blood and wild with the loss of his money, rushed up to Officer Bathke, at Seventh and Locust streets, declaring that the highwaymen had killed his companion, Officer Bathke led the injured man away from the scene of the robbery without an effort to overtake the highwaymen and sent him to the station. When Conductor Baumgardner, of the patrol wagon, learned that Gohde thought Scheerer was lying fatally injured, he sent under the tunnel he started back to inquire into the matter. In the meantime Officer Skoog had reached the scene of the robbery and saw that the robbers had also sent to the station. The crime on Gohde's head was sewed up by Assistant City Physician Leavitt.

As soon as Capt. Rouleau learned of the robbery he sent every detective attached to the central station on the case. Light on the Philippines. Rev. Mr. Aleotti Defends the Nation's Present War Policy. At the Universalist Church of the Messiah yesterday afternoon the pastor, Rev. A. L. Aleotti, took for the topic of his sermon "The New Light on the Philippines." A nation, he said, had its Christian duty

Just the same as an individual and should faithfully perform that duty. Each individual had his atom of influence in the performance of the Christian duty of the nation and should use that influence. He deprecated the use of the present situation and future policy in the Philippines as a subject of partisan controversy, and argued that the duty of the people of the United States was to find out what was their Christian duty and then to do that, regardless of partisanship.

The occupant of the Philippines, he said, was the necessary outcome of the fortunes of war, and the war was a righteous one; furthermore, it was in accordance with international law that the United States should occupy the Philippines. The United States had avoided war, and when it was finally decided to declare war against Spain all of the people of this country were agreed that it was unavoidable. The destruction of Montoli's fleet and the taking of Manila were, he argued, made necessary by circumstances, and the revolt of the followers of Aguinaldo against the authority of the United States was as though the blacks that had been freed as a result of the civil war had then declared that they wanted an entirely independent government and had resisted the Union forces with the arms furnished them by the United States.

The idea of an independent republic in the Philippines he declared to be nothing more than a myth and not possibly to be accomplished from the fact that the natives of the islands spoke sixty different languages and could not understand one another. The purpose of Aguinaldo and his followers was manifestly to subordinate the inhabitants of the smaller islands for the purpose of their own aggrandizement and tribute.

HIS FRIEND ARRESTED. But Blake, Alias Jones, Does Not Believe Him a Thief.

Charles Brown, whose correct name is said to be Charles Elliott, was locked up at the central police station yesterday on the charge of stealing \$70 from a companion who gave the name of George Jones, but who is said to be George Blake. Elliott is a fireman in the employ of the Chicago Great Western railroad, while Blake is an engineer working for the same road. The men were out seeing the sights Saturday night, and early Sunday morning brought up at a South Washington street resort. Later Blake missed his money and reported the theft to the police. After some investigation Irene Larson and Grace Thompson, inmates of the resort, and Charles Crowfoot, the porter, were locked up on suspicion. Subsequent developments, however, led to the release of the women and Crowfoot, who, the police say, were innocent, and Elliott was locked up instead.

Detectives Wells and Sweeney, who were detailed on the case, say they learned that Elliott had changed a couple of \$20 bills, money of the denomination such as Blake's, and had been stolen. They then arrested Elliott, and say that the prisoner confessed to having taken the money. Blake, the police say, refused to believe that investigation frame him, and declares he will not prosecute Elliott.

"I was prepared by what I had heard to find the boys in good health, but I was really surprised to find how well they really were. I can only express it by saying that they are in superlatively good physical condition. There are only a few cases of illness of any kind, and none of those can be regarded as at all serious. The boys are very comfortably situated in camp, and from my own observation I can say that the sanitary condition of the camp is the best that could be possible. The food served, while not so good perhaps as we have on our tables at home, is very good, and I judge much better than the boys get while they were away. The Thirteenth has been shown every possible courtesy by the California regiment, and, while the men are all anxious to get home, I am sure they will feel some regret at leaving San Francisco."

OPPOSES NICARAGUA CANAL

CONGRESSMAN J. T. MCCLARY SAYS THE PACIFIC SLOPE DOES NOT NEED IT

Opening of Asiatic Trade Has Given a New Market for the Products That Formerly Turned in an Opposite Direction for an Outlet.

"Since the opening up of the Asiatic trade there has been a very decided change in the sentiment of the people on the Pacific coast regarding the Nicaragua canal project," said Congressman J. T. McClary last evening at the Windsor, upon his return from a business trip through the West.

"A year ago nearly every one on the coast was in favor of establishing a waterway across the isthmus, and the subject was a very live one with the newspapers and with business men. Two years ago there was not one man in a hundred who did not look upon the scheme with favor. Today, however, the changed conditions commercially have placed the matter in a different light, and there is no enthusiasm on the subject whatever. On the contrary, there is a feeling that the slope would be better off without the direct route by water to the Atlantic coast. Before trade with the East was opened up the Pacific coast was looking for markets. Its timber and agricultural products could only find outlet through the trunk lines across the continent, but now the trade with the
