SPECIAL COUNCIL MEETING

One Will Probably Be Called for Tomorrow Night to Take Action on the One and a Half Mill Special School Tax Which Various Legal Authorities Have Declared to Be Unconstitutional.

In response to the recent resolution of the council directing the county auditor to include in the tax levy for 1899 the 1 1/2 mill tax authorized by the act of 1899 for school purposes Auditor Johnson has in preparation a letter to Mayor Kiefer declining to spread the 1 1/2 mill tax upon the rolls.

In his letter to the county auditor, Mr. Douglas said:

In your communication of the 18th instant you call attention to the fact that under the respective charters of the cities of St. Paul, Minneapolis and Duluth the legislature has limited the amount of taxes that may be levied against the taxable property of such cities to the sum of 2 1/2 mills upon the assessed valuation in St. Paul, 4 mills in Minneapolis and 3 mills in the city of Duluth.
