FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH TO CELEBRATE ITS SEMI-CENTENNIAL THIS WEEK SIX DAYS FULL OF SERVICES

Pastors of Other Denominations and Many Who Have Gone From the Church to Other Communities Will Take Part in the Services, Which Will Last Until Next Sunday.

Half a century ago, about where the roof of Nichols & Dean's hardware establishment at Fifth and Sibley streets, is now stood the old First Baptist church.

But the old church on "Baptist hill" was outgrown, and the hill itself, in the needs of the city, became a source of revenue, for with the gravel which was taken from it was built, after transmutation into "cash," the second home of the city into a public street, near Ninth, but half a block from the present home of the church, and but five blocks from the old First church site.

The only survivor of the fourteen persons who were present at the organization of the First Baptist church, Dec. 29, 1849, is Abraham H. Cavender. He was born in New Hampshire in 1815, and came to St. Paul, as above stated, in 1848.

Mr. Cavender's occupation was carriage making, which he followed for many years on Robert street, until he sold out to Quimby & Halliwell.

Rev. T. R. Cressey was pastor of the church for two years, beginning in 1852. He came from Indianapolis, Conn., and his family of eight children on a salary of \$800 a year, three-fourths of which was supplied from the East.

Rev. J. D. Pope served in the same capacity nine years, from 1857, during his incumbency the membership was again trebled, and the church on Wacouta street was built and occupied.
