DEWEY, MAYBE OLNEY WOULD BE FAVORED BY EASTERN DEMOCRACY FOR THE PRESIDENCY

A. B. OVITT'S OBSERVATIONS

Just Back From New York, He Says the Eastern Enthusiasm Over the Hero of Manila Would Have Been Tremendous—Bird S. Coler Coming to the Front in Manhattan Politics.

Albert B. Ovitt, the attorney, returned yesterday from an extended business trip to New York and Washington, and to a Globe reporter whom he met at the Merchants' hotel last night he talked interestingly in regard to recent events in the East, being a spectator of the first attempt of the yachts in the contest for the America's cup, and also witnessing the parade in honor of Admiral Dewey in the metropolis.

"I never saw such a crowd of people in my life. The streets were packed for eight miles, and the enthusiasm was tremendous. One thing I observed especially was to hear the applause which greeted Admiral Dewey more enthusiastically than that for Admiral Sampson. I should say that it was second only to that given Admiral Dewey and the Gov. Roosevelt and Gen. Miles were greeted next in cordiality. There seems to be a sentiment in the Eastern States that if the Democrats had followed the battle of Santiago. No doubt Admiral Sampson is entitled to the credit he gets for planning the engagement, yet the fact remains that Dewey was there to carry it out, and did, in so far as was voted by the people, a large share in the credit. But the ovation given this modest man Dewey was far and away above all of them. I am inclined to believe, with a number of Democrats whom I have talked with in New York City, that Dewey is the man who would have made a winning presidential candidate. There is a wide feeling in New York that Bryan, however magnetic he is, cannot be elected, and the Eastern Democrats feel that should not only carry the states they won in 1886, if possible, but some others. Olney is favored by some element of the Democracy in the East.

"With regard to local politics of New York, my impression is that the coming leader of the Democracy in that city is the present comptroller, Bird S. Coler, who has proved a very popular man. I believe he is the strongest Democrat in New York City today, and means the strongest man, politically. There is a considerable feeling against Croker, among the organization, high-minded Democrats, who believe in organization for the purposes of party work, but are not content to have the terms Croker and Tammany used as synonyms, are chafing under the present condition and would like to have the organization with another leader if possible. Mr. Coler is a man who does not want apparently, to be in any way connected with the party, but goes into important questions, assumes his position as a reformer, and makes a study and when he reached a compromise he held that should not be held to it. Similarly he went into the Municipal water contract and has made a study of it.
