**PUBLIC SCHOOL LANDS**

**SENATOR DAVIS SEEKS TO FILE A BILL IN EQUITY IN THE MINNESOTA CASE**

**SUPREME COURT TO CONSIDER**

Matter is the Result of a Controversy of Many Years' Standing, and Involves a Large Quantity of Land Claimed to Have Been Granted by Government When Entry Was Established.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—At today's sitting of the United States supreme court a number of cases involving constitutional questions, which had been assigned for hearing next week, were re-assigned, to be heard on the 30th instant, when Justice Harlan, who presided, said it was expected a full bench was to be held.

The court today admitted a large number of attorneys to the bar, and heard several motions. Speaker Reed was among the counsel present. He moved the admission of three attorneys, and entered a motion for a writ of certiorari in a steamship damage case from California.

On behalf of the attorney general of Minnesota Senator Davis asked leave to file a bill in equity against the secretary of the interior and the commissioner of the general land office, in a case involving the ownership of public school lands of Minnesota. The request was taken under advisement. This case is a result of a controversy of many years' standing, and involves a large quantity of land claimed to have been granted by the general government when entry was established.

**NAVY ASSIGNMENTS.**

**Admiral Schley and Farragut Arranging for New Duties.**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—Rear Admiral Schley called at the navy department today to arrange with the officials for the details of his staff and some other matters relating to the assumption of his duties as commander of the South Atlantic station. The admiral asked for the detail of Lieutenant Commander Mariscal, Mr. McCormick introduced Secretary of State Hay. Nearly every member of the cabinet present with Mr. McKinley and the secretary of state.

**CASE IN EQUITY.**

**Action That Promises Some Interesting Legal Developments.**

A case in equity promising interesting legal developments is that brought in the United States district court by Henry Wernecke as guardian for Reinhold E. Duhne, both of Manitowish water, Wisconsin, against Llewellyn A. Arnold, Fannie J. Arnold, his wife, and the Farmers' and Mechanics' bank of this city. In the complaint it is alleged that the Farmers' and Mechanics' bank is Duhne's guardian, and that the action is brought, is incompetent to manage his business or property. About a year ago the county court appointed Carl H. Paulus as guardian of the estate. On Sept. 24 of this year Paulus was removed by the same court for incompetency and mismanagement of Duhne's estate, and Wernecke appointed in his stead.

**SCOTCHMEN ARE ASTR.**

The coming season promises to be an eventful one in the history of the St. Andrew's Scotch society. Of late the Scotch have been making a name for themselves that their society was not doing the work it has in former years, and it was the result of this that the Scotch matter that much more could be accomplished to that end. It is intended to reorganize the society, and a meeting was held at Nicollet hall last night for that purpose. It was decided to hold many meetings during the winter.

**FIGHT WITH ROBBERS.**

**Osseo Saloon Man Gives Two of Them a Hot Game.**

OSSEO, Minn., Oct. 10.—Nic Eckes, proprietor of a saloon in this place, was attacked by two armed men who contemplated robbery and who were thwarted by Eckes' determined resistance.

About 11 o'clock Eckes started to go upstairs, carrying his coat, bow tie, and a lantern in one hand and a loaded revolver in the other. As he was about to take the first step upward, a man jumped from the stairs and grabbed him. Eckes immediately leveled his gun and fired, and without loss of time placed the weapon against the breast of his assailant and fired a second time. A second man had appeared in the meantime and, fourth shot Eckes in the right arm near the shoulder. Eckes dropped his cash box and the men ran away in the darkness, but not until two more shots had been exchanged.

Eckes had been assaulted and robbed before, which explains the fact that he was armed for trouble. The ball in his arm has not been located. He had \$40 in the box and \$200 in his pockets. He believes that the first robber is badly wounded at least, and possibly dead. Nothing is known of the second man who was discovered. A thorough search may reveal some sensational features. His assailants are generally thought to be residents of here who were posted as to his habits.

**Hold Their Annual Meeting and Elect Officers.**

ROCHESTER, Minn., Oct. 10.—(Special.)—The women's club of this city, held its annual meeting today and elected officers as follows: President, Mrs. W. F. Fowler; vice president, Mrs. A. F. Faltout; secretary, Miss Ella J. Davis; treasurer, Mrs. W. N. Herrick. Miss Davis and Miss Cross were elected delegates to represent the club at the annual meeting of the Minnesota state federation, to be held in St. Cloud, Minn., on the 15th and 16th inst. The number of business men and firms subscribing to the support of the reception rooms is eighty. Average monthly collections, \$12.46; regular monthly cost of maintaining the rooms, \$35. The discrepancy between the regular income and the expenses has been made up by special gifts, as is shown in the treasurer's report.

**FOREST FIRES RAGING.**

**Great Damage Being Done in Vicinity of Oconto Falls, Wis.**

OCONTO FALLS, Wis., Oct. 10.—Forest fires are raging in the vicinity of an alarming extent. The air is filled with smoke and the sky reflects a deep red hue at night. Six farm houses have been burned, and a large amount of hay and miles of fences consumed. Unless rain comes at once a large amount of property will be destroyed.

**CHAIRMAN JONES, OF THE DEMOCRATIC NATIONAL COMMITTEE, IN WASHINGTON**

**TALKS FREELY OF ISSUES**

Says Anti-Trust and Anti-Imperialism Will Be the Principal Points Dwelt Upon in Democratic Argument—Money Issue Will Not Be Wholly Ignored—Talk of Removal of Headquarters.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—Chairman Jones, of the national Democratic committee, and Mrs. Jones arrived in Washington today. The senator's health has very much improved. In a few days Senator Jones expects to leave the city for Arkansas, to remain for some time, thus making it improbable that he will take any active part in the fall campaign.

Regarding the reported contemplated change in the headquarters of the national committee from Chicago to Washington, the chairman declined to talk at length, saying, however, that the disposition of that matter would be left entirely in the hands of the vice chairman of the committee, Mr. Johnson.

**CAPT. CHADWICK'S SWORD.**

**It Was Presented in the Presence of Thousands of Veterans.**

MORGANTOWN, W. Va., Oct. 10.—Chadwick day was celebrated by 2,500 people today. The special train with the naval officers arrived at 6 o'clock and a salute in honor of Admiral Sampson was fired by the university cadets. In the party were Admiral Sampson, Capt. Chadwick and wife, Lieut. C. S. Marsh and wife and Commander S. A. Staunton.

Among the distinguished visitors were Gov. Atkinson, Senators Ekins and Scott, ex-Senator Davis, Congressman Dayton, Secretary of State Dawson, Gen. Spillman, Gen. Appleton, Col. Babb and Maj. Elliott.

It was nearly noon when the procession started. The parade was divided into three grand divisions, composed of the veterans of the Civil war and Spanish-American wars, national guards of West Virginia and Pennsylvania and civic societies.

At the parade Gov. Atkinson presented the sword to Capt. Chadwick, on behalf of the people of the state.

Capt. Chadwick was deeply touched and thanked the people through the governor in feeling terms.

Other addresses followed, including a brief one by Admiral Sampson.

The New York Times corresponds with naval regulations steel decorated in gold and bears the inscription:

Presented to Capt. F. E. Chadwick, Oct. 10, 1899, by the citizens of West Virginia.

On the reverse is a signature of the cruiser New York with the words:

An ideal ship with an ideal captain.

This is surrounded with a suitable ornamental cone.

The scabbard is made of sterling silver, heavily oxidized, and relieved by intricate decorations. Above the upper band is the coat of arms of the state of West Virginia, with the motto.

At the tip of the scabbard is a massive silver knob with the words "1861-1865" on the sides of the belt and trappings are of solid gold and sterling silver.

**RECEIVER WANTED.**

**Iowa Insurance Company is in a Stinky Condition.**

DES MOINES, Mo., Oct. 8.—The attorney general has applied at Waterloo for a receiver for the Equitable Mutual Life Association of that city. The action was taken under direct orders of the state auditor who reports the association in bad shape for some time. The trouble results from a consolidation of three or four other concerns with this one, resulting in some complications. The officers of the association are: George W. Harbin, president; E. H. Phelps, vice president; F. H. Loring, secretary. The last annual statement showed the company's income for the year \$144,339, and disbursements \$144,381; assets shown by the ledger are \$5,717.33.
