SOPHIA STRAKA BECOMES THE LAWFUL WIFE OF LOUIS WIEDL

WOULD NOT WAIT FOR SPRING

It Was the Parental Desire That the Loving Couple Have the Nuptial Knot Tied in the Matting Season, But the Young People Were Impatient—Orchestra Has a New Leader.

In defiance of parental authority Miss Sophia Straka, daughter of John Straka, proprietor of the Tivoli, at Wabasha and Third streets, and Louis Wiedl, were united in marriage yesterday afternoon by Court Commissioner Gallick at the court house. In the evening, when the news of the wedding was broken to him by a Globe representative, Papa Straka bowed gracefully to the inevitable and there was one of the old time reconciliations with a realistic "Bless you, my children." Miss Sophia Straka was the eldest unmarried daughter of Proprietor John Straka and to her fell the honor of playing first violin and leading the orchestra at the Tivoli. About five months ago Louis Wiedl, a good looking young man, began to attend the evening performances at the Tivoli with unfailing regularity. In the course of events it became apparent that the leader of the orchestra was the attraction that drew him to the music hall, and soon it became apparent that Miss Straka reciprocated his passion. Papa Straka did not like the idea of his orchestra being robbed of its leader by matrimony, but a few weeks ago he rose to the occasion and gave his consent to a marriage in the spring.

Spring looked as far off as the Paris exposition to the young people who were in love, and yesterday they went around in the afternoon to the office of the clerk of courts and obtained a marriage license. A few minutes later and they had been united in marriage by Court Commissioner Gallick, with Deputy Clerk



**ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION.**

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, that the undersigned, who are and who are to be, do hereby associate ourselves for incorporation under the laws of the State of Minnesota, and to that end do hereby adopt the following articles of incorporation:

**ARTICLE I.** The name of this corporation shall be "National Novelty Company."

**Section 2.** The general nature of its business shall be the buying, owning, selling, dealing in and otherwise acquiring and disposing of all kinds of novelties and sundry articles of manufacture adapted for use, entertainment or ornament at places of public resort, refreshment, amusement or accommodation.

**Section 3.** The principal place for transacting the business of said corporation shall be at the City of Minneapolis in the County of Hennepin and State of Minnesota.

**ARTICLE II.** Said corporation shall commence on the twentieth day of October, A. D. 1899, and shall continue for the period of thirty years.

**Section 1.** The amount of capital stock of said corporation shall be fifty thousand dollars.

**Section 2.** Said capital stock shall be paid in as called for by the Board of Directors of said corporation.

**ARTICLE IV.** The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which said corporation shall at any time be subject shall be twenty-five thousand dollars.

**ARTICLE V.** The names and places of residence of the persons forming said corporation are as follows: Emil Zimmermann, John O'Brien and Edward Haynes, all of the City of St. Paul, Minnesota.

**ARTICLE VI.** The names of the first Board of Directors of said corporation shall be as follows: Emil Zimmermann, John O'Brien and Edward Haynes, who shall serve until their successors are duly elected and qualified.

**Section 3.** Annual meetings of the stockholders of said corporation shall be held at its office in the City of Minneapolis on the first Monday in the month of November of each year, commencing with the year 1899, ten o'clock in the forenoon for the election of such board of directors and the transaction of other business. And said Board of Directors shall hold annual meetings, at said place and on said day as last mentioned, immediately after adjournment of said stockholders' meeting, commencing with the year 1899, for the election of said directors and the transaction of other business. Said directors and officers shall serve until their successors are duly elected and qualified.

**Section 4.** The by-laws of said corporation shall be prescribed and adopted by said Board of Directors, who may amend and repeal the same from time to time.

**ARTICLE VII.** The capital stock of said corporation shall be divided into five hundred shares of one hundred dollars each.
