NO CHANGE IN THE OFFICERS

Increased Gross Earnings Are Due, President Hayes Says, to the General Prosperity of the Country—The Equipment of the Line Increased During the Year—Consolidation of the Branch Lines.

The annual meeting of the St. Paul & Duluth railroad was held yesterday noon at the St. Paul general offices. There were present: President R. Somers Hayes, of New York; Francis H. Leggett, of New York; Clarence Day, of New York; A. B. Plough, and J. L. Riker, of the board of directors of the road. Owing to unavoidable circumstances, A. H. Stevens, G. G. Haven Jr., Thomas Denny, all of New York, and William R. Merriam, members of the board, were unable to be present.

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Commenting on the showing of the road for the year, President Hayes says in his annual statement: "The gross earnings for the year were very satisfactory, and are due to the general prosperity of the country. The increase noted this year in the item of conducting transportation is due to additional and improved train services and to the handling of increased tonnage at stations. An increase is also noted in maintenance of equipment, due to heavy repairs on locomotives and the charging to repairs on freight cars of the proportional cost of 200 box cars purchased during the year. A proportionately large amount of tonnage is shown this year, due to increase in prices for coal, supply materials and wages."

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AGENTS AT A BANQUET

ST. PAUL PASSENGER AND TICKET AGENTS ENTERTAIN THEIR CANADIAN VISITORS

DAY SPENT IN TWIN CITIES

Canadian Ticket Agents' Association Took Advantage of the Chance to See the President and the Two Cities En Route Home From Their Annual Convention at Winnetka.

Two hundred members of the Canadian Ticket Agents' association, en route to their homes in Quebec, and Ontario, were entertained in St. Paul yesterday afternoon as the guests of the Twin City Ticket Agents' association, and were given a banquet at the Ryan at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, prior to their departure for Chicago.

The Canadian agents come from all parts of Southern Canada, and have recently completed their annual convention in Winnipeg. From Winnipeg they were brought to the cities in a special train over the Northern Pacific, arriving in Minneapolis at 7:30 yesterday morning and coming to St. Paul at 4 in the afternoon. Many of the agents were accompanied by their wives and the visit to the cities, with its attractions in the homecoming of a volunteer regiment and the visit of President McKinley and his party, was a very enjoyable occasion.

The Minneapolis agents started the ball rolling, and gave the visitors a breakfast at the West hotel. No effort was spared to give the agents an all-round up-to-date time, and after a whirl of pleasure in the other city, the agents came to St. Paul to continue the fun. A coupon ticket, showing the entertainment to be afforded, was prepared for each member of the party, and every coupon was ridden to the limit. These tickets also contained a letter from the mayors of both St. Paul and Minneapolis.

The party was met on its arrival from Minneapolis by the St. Paul committee, and taken at once to the Ryan, where an informal reception was held in the parlors, previous to the banquet. The visiting agents met a large number of the St. Paul railroad fraternity and the half hour before the doors of the dining room were thrown open was very pleasantly spent.

The banquet was served in six courses and gave the Canadians a faint idea of what Americans are in the habit of doing for their friends. The entertainment was lavish, the viands excellent, and the visitors thoroughly enjoyed the occasion. At the conclusion of the feast, President W. E. Rispin, of the visiting agents' association, took occasion to comment on the reception given in St. Paul and to thank the local agents. Said he: "I am sure that my fellow members of the association will agree with me that the city of St. Paul is one of the most beautiful in the world, and the reception given here is one of the most generous and hospitable I have ever witnessed."

President Rispin then called for three cheers for the St. Paul agents, which were given with spirit and a rousing cheer. Oscar Vanderbilt, chairman of the St. Paul committee, was forced to the floor to respond, and said in part: "I wish to say that when you are in a position to return the favor, you may have been shown here, look out for us. We will come and see you some of these days and examine that governor general of yours; money every man in any other sight which may be appropriate for country cousins."

"It has afforded the St. Paul agents much pleasure to be able to entertain your association, and if we have a wish to offer it is that occasions such as these where agents of our two great Northern countries can get together and become acquainted with each other may be frequent. We will part from you, giving you our best wishes and hoping to see you again in the near future."

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS that we, whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves for the purpose of incorporating under the laws of the State of Minnesota, and to that end do hereby adopt the following articles of incorporation: ARTICLE I. Section 1. The name of this corporation shall be THE GREAT NORTHERN MASSAGE AND MANICURING CO. Section 2. The general nature of its business shall be the buying, owning, selling and disposing of all kinds of novelties and sundry articles of manufacture adapted for use in entertainment parlors and places of public resort, refreshment, amusement and recreation.
