NEWS OF RAILROADS

ST. PAUL-CHICAGO RATE WAR GIVES NO PROSPECT OF SETTLEMENT

"WEAK LINES" INSISTENT

They Say They Have Been at the Mercy of the Short Routes Long Enough, and They Will Fiddle Until the Other Lines Are Tired of Dancing—Meeting to Be Held Tomorrow.

St. Paul passenger officials place little confidence in an adjustment of differences in the meeting to be held in Chicago tomorrow to effect a stiffening of St. Paul-Chicago rates. The present situation, viewed from this end of the line, presents little chance over that prevailing a month ago. The Wisconsin Central and Minneapolis & St. Louis roads still refuse to join the Western Passenger association, and the other roads refuse to make a move until the two "weak lines" surrender. For this reason there is no means of securing an agreement on Chicago rates.

Woolworth Traffic Manager.

J. G. Woolworth, late general freight agent of the Oregon Railway and Navigation company, has been appointed traffic manager of the Pacific Coast company, in charge of the company's railroad and ocean business. Mr. Woolworth received his railroad education in the general freight office of the Northwestern in Chicago.

Pennsylvania Improvements.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 24.—A party of Pennsylvania railway officials were in the city today for the purpose of deciding upon improved terminal facilities in this city to handle the heavy traffic which will be laid between Hudson, O., and the city, and the Pennsylvania docks will be increased by 150 feet.

To Chicago for \$4.

The Great Northern brought in 100 Italian laborers yesterday en route to Chicago on the purpose of securing work on the new line. The rate of \$7.50 per man, including board and passage, was improved upon by the brokers, who sold tickets for \$4, and captured a large amount of the travel.

M. K. & T. Acquisition.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 24.—The Kansas City & Eldon road has been sold to the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railroad company for the amount of its bonded indebtedness, \$225,000.

GEN. MILES WILL HUNT.

Will Be the Guest of Once Famous Scout "Buffalo Bill."

OMAHA, Oct. 24.—Gen. Nelson A. Miles and party arrived in this city this morning. They were met at the depot by Gen. Merriam and the officers of the headquarters staff here. Col. W. F. Cody and a number of prominent citizens. During the day the general visited old Fort Omaha which has been abandoned since 1879. In the evening he visited the building of Fort Crook. The general has always favored keeping the old fort in condition for occupancy, and in view of the necessity of providing healthy and convenient posts for regiments returning from the tropics, is now more than ever in favor of putting the buildings in repair, and using them in connection with the new fort. During the day he visited the exposition, and in the afternoon started west over the Burlington for the mountains, where he will go on a hunting trip with Col. Cody. Col. Cody has had a telephone line sixty miles long constructed to the hunting camp, so that the general can keep in touch with the outer world.

Hundhausen Gets Twenty Years.

CHICAGO, Oct. 24.—Herman Hundhausen, of Herman, Mo., who has been in trial for complicity in the murder of Walter F. Koehler, Sept. 2, was sentenced today to twenty years in the penitentiary. Hundhausen and Richard Honeck, his partner in the crime, went to Koehler's room, where the latter was sick in bed, and stabbed Koehler to death. During the trial Hundhausen declared he did not know Honeck intended to kill Koehler.

PROMOTER SEEKS PAY.

Sugar Trust Formation Involves a Claim for \$225,000.

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—The trial of an action brought by Henry Heintz against Theodore E. Havemeyer, Henry O. Havemeyer, Frederick Haveny and Charles H. Sent, to recover \$225,000 commissions for his services in the consolidation of the companies which now form the American Sugar Refining company, was commenced in the supreme court today before Justice Andrews and a jury. The plaintiff alleges that he was intimately acquainted with all the details of the sugar trade and with new steel. The matter came to the attention of the railroad and warehouse commission through complaints from citizens of towns along the branch. Commissioners Ringdahl and Becker made an inspection trip to the branch and notified the Great Northern of their conclusion. Vice President Hill and Gen. Supt. Ward assured the members of the commission that the required improvements would be made as soon as materials could be secured, but owing to great difficulty in securing shipments from the East. It was their opinion that the work would be done in the winter months. In the meantime they agreed that the road would put the line in a safe condition.

FORTY-TWO WIVES.

Walter Farnsworth Breaks All National Records.

CHICAGO, Oct. 24.—Forty-two wives, scattered throughout the world, four of whom are in Chicago, was the confession made today by Walter N. Farnsworth, a Chicago county commissioner, who was arrested yesterday charged with bigamy. Farnsworth also admitted that he was a man of many aliases. Some of these were: Charles Bradford, A. J. Hittle, S. L. Thomas, A. L. Kiefer and Bradshaw. "I cannot tell exactly how many women I have married," said he. "I know of eleven in Europe, four in China, three in Peru, and one in the United States. Others in different parts of the world, but to save my soul, I could not tell how many. I married them for different reasons. I did not live more than a day or two at a time with them. They will tell you I was good to them."

DIED TOGETHER.

Cuban Kills His Sweetheart and Himself.

PEORIA, Ill., Oct. 24.—Juan Garcia, a Cuban, and his sweetheart, Miss Estelle Mathoney, daughter of a prominent publisher, were found dead today in a road near here. Garcia had shot the girl last night and then killed himself. The Cuban wanted to marry the girl, but her parents had objected.

CATTLE KING ILL.

Grant G. Gillette Reported Suffering an Attack of Smallpox.

ABILENE, Kan., Oct. 24.—Telegrams from Chinshua, Mexico, says that Grant G. Gillette, the cattle pioneer, who fled from Kansas a year ago, after double mortgaging his stock for over \$100,000, is very ill with what is believed to be smallpox.

JESTER INDICTED.

Held to Answer for Murder Committed Twenty-Eight Years Ago.

PARIS, Oct. 24.—The grand jury today returned an indictment for murder in the first degree against Alexander Jester, on the charge of murdering Gilbert Gates, brother of a Chicago millionaire, twenty-eight years ago. The indictment contains twelve counts and covers every theory of murder from unknown means to a knife, pistol and poison.

SOLDIERS' TRAIN NOT WRECKED.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—Col. Lee, chief army quartermaster at Chicago, today wired the war department that the report that the Thirty-eighth Infantry, which is preparing for duty at the Pacific coast from Jefferson barracks to the Pacific coast, had been wrecked is incorrect.
