#### GARBAGE PROBLEM LOCAL

It Must Be Settled, Say Experts, According to the Needs and Means of Each Locality—Cremation in General the Most Satisfactory System—Symposium at the City Hall—The News of the Mill City.

At the request of Health Commissioner Norton, of Minneapolis, two of the men who have taken a prominent part in the convention of the Public Health Association, took part in a meeting held yesterday morning to discuss the problem of garbage disposal, which is just now a very important matter for Minneapolis. The speakers were Health Commissioner Woodward, of Washington city, and Col. Morse, of New York, one of the leading sanitary engineers of the country. Both gentlemen were thoroughly primed for their work, and covered their respective fields with dispatch and in most interesting style. The audience included about a dozen of the city council, among them the members of the health and hospital committee, various city officials and a number of interested outsiders, among others Dr. Folwell, of the university. Dr. Woodward told of the methods used in his city, and gave liberally of his fund of information on the general subject, gathered from actual experience. After covering this phase of the question in a general way, Col. Morse answered questions put to him regarding the situation in Minneapolis, and the proper way to deal with the problem here. He declared that reduction was out of the question; that a crematory was the only thing that would fill the bill. As for the style of crematory, he thought the city would do well to pay a third or half more for a plant and get one of the English pattern. The English plant includes a boiler, and the energy produced by the burning of the garbage is turned into electricity and used for municipal purposes, or sold with great economical advantage to the city. An important feature of this system is a draft that generates a heat of 2,000 degrees, and disposes of garbage much more rapidly than under the American system. He thought the city could make a deal to buy such a plant outright, or have one built and enter into a contract with the company to destroy the garbage at a certain rate per ton for a series of years. Or, if it was desired, the company would probably add to the duty the collection of the garbage.

ment problem. The final desideratum was to develop thereby a steam or electric power that could be turned into money for the city's benefit. There were many English cities doing this, and there was no reason why it couldn't be done in this country. The contract system of doing this work, he thought, was the cheaper, while direct city management was the more responsible, and gave the most satisfactory results in the long run. The latter system would cost more, but would result in an absolutely clean city. Dr. Woodward's experience had satisfied him that garbage disposal was a local problem. Each city must find out for itself what was the most advantageous system. In every case, however, cities should have the aid of expert assistance. Both gentlemen were piled with questions at the conclusion of their talks, and were brought out in this way. They were given a hearty vote of thanks at the conclusion of the meeting.

#### WANTS THE ITEMS.

Park Board Desires More Light on Harriet Shortage.

The Minneapolis park board committee yesterday afternoon to consider the claim of the street car company relative to the deficit resulting from the Banda Rosa concert and other entertainment at Lake Harriet last summer. According to a contract made between a committee of the park board and the street car company, the former was to stand the cost of any deficit that might arise not to exceed \$2,000 for its proportion of the shortage. It now appears that the deficit amounts to \$6,000 in all, but the board is called upon to settle on the basis of \$1,500, which represents the shortage as to the entertainment proper, such as paying the band, the employment of ushers and the like. The question arose as to whether some of the items did not in fact work on the float, repairs on the pavilion, and an itemized bill was called for. A meeting of the board will be held Monday night, when the matter may be settled.

#### CHINA RICHEST MARKET.

Splendid Possibilities Offered for Trade With This Country. George F. Page, of Boston, Mass., is in Minneapolis on his way home from the Orient, where he has been for a year past. Mr. Page is a "trade expansion" enthusiast. He believes that China offers a remarkably rich market for American goods and is going to impress that belief upon the people of several of the larger American cities.

Mr. Page went to China in the interests of a number of American merchant houses, and has been selling goods to the Chinese for several months past. He is now on his way home to Boston, but is spending some time on the way in an effort to enlighten the business men of the West and middle West in regard to the immense possibilities China offers for trade with this country. Mr. Page will meet the business men of Minneapolis in the rooms of the board of trade, Lumber Exchange, Tuesday afternoon at 8 o'clock and will there lay the situation fully before them.

"Of all the foreign markets offered for American goods," said Mr. Page yesterday, "beyond question China is much the largest and best. There trade is rapidly extending and, unlike the Japanese, they

#### ASSAULT MADE BY THUGS

#### Brutal Attempt at Duluth to Make Way With the Proceeds of a Football Game—Boy in the Ticket Office Badly Beaten, but Did Not Give Up the Money in His Charge.

DULUTH, Minn., Nov. 4.—During the progress of a football game between eleven from Ironwood and the Duluth High School eleven, at the fair grounds this morning, thugs made a terrible assault on Rene Hugo, a high school boy in charge of the ticket office. They were frightened off before securing any money. The ticket office is 500 feet from the grand stand and in a spot not entirely isolated, although in the suburbs. The boy was found unconscious in the ticket office by Alderman Banes. One hand was trust in his coat pocket, the other in his trousers' pocket. In each was money and he had clung to it with a desperation that may yet cost him his life.

#### Mass of Wreckage.

WINONA, Minn., Nov. 4.—(Special.)—Four flat cars today brought in to the Winona shops the mass of wreckage, resulting from the Northwestern head end collision, which occurred at New Ulm a few days ago. The engine in which Engineer Hanson lost his life was so badly wrecked that it had to be consigned to the scrap pile. The remainder of the mass was little better, and the entire lot was ordered wrecked and melted down by the officials.

#### Robbery Attempted.

SIoux FALLS, S. D., Nov. 4.—An unsuccessful attempt was made to rob the postoffice at Rowena, six miles east of here, last night. George Robinson, a coal barber and ex-convict, and O. E. Prink, also an ex-convict, both of this city, are now in jail charged with the crime.


#### First Train to Faribault.

#### Fire Was Fatal.

SIoux FALLS, S. D., Nov. 4.—About 10 o'clock this morning the residence of Mrs. Ann Boylan, located on the corner of First and Broadway streets, was destroyed by fire. Neighbors opened the back door only to be driven back by smoke. A second attempt was made to get into the house, which was successful. Mrs. Boylan, who was a widow and slightly demented, was found unconscious on the floor. She was removed from the building in her night dress and taken to the city hospital.

#### Mayor Found Guilty.

SIoux FALLS, S. D., Nov. 4.—(Special.)—Max Richard A. Tubbs, of Alcester, was found guilty in the United States court here today of sending obscene literature through the mails. He will be sentenced by Judge Carlund on Monday, at which time motion will be made by his attorneys for a new trial. The case, owing to the prominence of the defendant, has attracted unusual attention.

#### Public Library Site.

DULUTH, Minn., Nov. 4.—The city council and public library board have notified Andrew Carnegie that Duluth stands ready to purchase a tract 150x100 feet on the corner of Second street and First Avenue west, for the proposed public library building, subject to his approval. The city will pay \$10,000 for the site, leaving a bill of Mr. Carnegie's \$20,000 to go into the building.
