WORK OF TRAIN WRECKERS

THREE FATALLY AND MANY OTHERS SERIOUSLY INJURED THE RESULT

Michigan Central Train Ditched by the Spreading of Rails, Bolts That Held Fish Plates Having Been Removed—A Brave Engineer.

TOLEDO, O., Nov. 9.—Michigan Central train No. 310 from Toledo to Detroit, was ditched by the spreading of rails between Alexis and Vienna, Mich., about 8 o'clock tonight. Three persons were fatally injured. They are: John Mackay, Indianapolis, rib broken, cut about face and head by glass; John O'Neil, Detroit, William, cut about head and arms, and Dr. Hamilton, engineer, bruised and probably internally injured. The seriously injured are: Charles Calvert, Detroit, hand and arm hurt; Maxine Faneuff, Wallbridge, O., shoulder dislocated; Charles Kress, Detroit, head badly cut and neck lacerated; Joseph Rosenthal, Detroit, badly bruised and cut about head with glass; Devere M. Ashton, Detroit, three ribs broken, and face cut; Mrs. Sarah Whipple, Monroe, Mich., head badly hurt and body bruised; Dean Ashmore, Detroit, arm nearly severed at wrist; S. A. Freshney, Fort Wayne, Ind., hurt about head, knee dislocated; Ralph Sparr, New York, hand and wrist badly cut; Conductor Markins, bruised about the body.

The accident was the result of a deliberate piece of work by unknown train wreckers, and happened at a point just beyond a short trestle. Two freight trains had passed over the road in safety a short time before. Where the rails were spread it was found that the bolts that held the fish plates had been unscrewed. The nuts were lying on the ties and the threads of the bolts were not marked in any way. A couple of wrenches, such as section hands use, were found lying beside the track, indicating how the rails had been loosened.

No Rest for Records. CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—The quarter-mile record, held by unknown train wreckers, was broken today at the face of a stiff breeze, clipped 1-1/2 seconds from the record of yesterday.

PARTS WITH DELANEY CHAMPION JEFFRIES ANNOUNCES THAT HE AND HIS TRAINER HAVE SEPARATED

WAS JEALOUS OF RYAN Man Who Directed the Physical Preparation of Corbett, Jeffries and Other Fighters is Shelled Because He Said Jeffries Had Not Trained Properly for His Battle With Sailor Tom Sharkey.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—It was bulletined on the afternoon of the Jeffries-Sharkey fight that Trainer Delaney had announced publicly that he was not responsible for the physical condition of the champion and that Manager Brady had branded it as a "trainers' quarrel." It has since developed that both stories were correct. Delaney did make a statement in which he disclaimed all responsibility for Jeffries' condition, but was subsequently induced to modify it, and, as Mr. Brady said, there was a trainers' quarrel, which has resulted in the retirement of Delaney from Jeffries' retinue and the installment of Tommy Ryan as trainer in chief. In commenting upon Delaney's statement Jeffries said yesterday:

"That was a nice thing for him to say, wasn't it? I would never have believed it of him. Why, it looks as if he wanted to see me licked. I have the best of feeling toward Billy and am of the opinion that he must have been laboring under some delusion when he made that statement. Had there been any ground for such remarks—he knows in his heart and soul that there wasn't—he ought to have kept it to himself, as it was merely a professional secret.

"I really thought Delaney was 'joshing' and after the fight we had a private talk. When he admitted that it was so, that he said I was unfit to fight, was amazed. I said: 'Billy, do you mean that? How could you after the manner I have treated you?' He went away in an angry mood and that was the last I saw or heard of him since.

JEALOUS OF RYAN. "Well, I might as well say right here that he and Ryan don't pull very well together. He is sore because I engaged Ryan. Well, what was I to do? Ryan is a fast, cool fellow and I have learned a lot from him. If I had taken Delaney's advice I would never have known as much about the game as I do. He wanted me to work with slow men, but I refused to do it. I don't say that I know all about the game as yet. I have lots to learn and by sticking to Ryan I will be able to win a lot of battles. Would you believe it, Ryan and I boxed as hard as we could every day and I felt more fatigued after I got through with him than I did in my battle with Sharkey."

"If Delaney says I was not fit he is telling an untruth. How could I have stood twenty-five rounds and allowed Sharkey to touch me? He says the way he did? Anyone with common sense knows that I must have been all right to do this. You can gamble that if I thought I was 'wrong' I wouldn't have entered the ring. He is all over me and I am sorry for Delaney. He had a good thing and did not know how to appreciate it. He received \$100 a week and got seven thousand dollars for me when I won. That was fair, I think."

"Will he train you any more?" the reporter asked. "I don't think he will," the champion replied. "I am going to have a talk with my manager, Billy Brady, and will have more to say on the subject later in the week."

Ryan, when questioned about the controversy, said: "Delaney is jealous of me and Jim did not like it. Jeffries followed my advice that he should get the coach who consulted Delaney. This angered Bill and he scarcely spoke a word to any of us for weeks past. When he says that Jeffries did not weigh more than 204 pounds, I am justifying him. Jeffries entered the ring at 215 pounds and when the battle was over he tipped the beam at 206 pounds."

THE GROUNDS OF THE NEW CLUB will probably be on the Southern boulevard, near the Harlem river, where a two weeks' option has been secured. PLEA FOR WORKERS. AMERICAN EQUAL WAGE UNION ISSUES AN ADDRESS TO EMPLOYERS AND EMPLOYEES.

EQUITABLE WAGES ARE ASKED. Capital and Labor Should Not Be Arrayed in Constant Warfare, but Should Mutually Seek Best for Both Interests—Self-Preservation Justifies Demand for Proper Compensation for Work Performed.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 9.—The supreme council of the American Equal Wage union, recently incorporated under the laws of Missouri, with headquarters in Kansas City, today issued an address to the wage-workers of the United States. The union was founded upon the belief that to eradicate the practice of paying lower wages to the women for the same work performed by men means to revolutionize the sociological conditions of the country. Its main object is to secure justice for women who work for wages, to protect children from unnecessary industrial servitude, and to discourage strikes and moral persuasion. Extracts from the address follow:

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—McLaughlin and Gallagher tonight entered upon the fourth of their five nights of cushion curl on play at Maurice Daly's billiard academy, and again the white-haired man from Chicago, Tom Gallagher, ran out his string of 20 points first, leaving McLaughlin, the Philadelphia, at 132. There was no doubt about Chicago being in excellent form tonight. His opponent, who led him from start to finish. This makes an even break of two games each for the players, and tomorrow night the deciding game will be played. McLaughlin's average was 4-4-37, and his best breaks were 25, 22 and 15.

GOEBEL'S PLURALITY. With Thirty-Five Precincts to Come He Has 941 Votes.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 10.—The Courier-Journal's returns received up to 2 a. m. cover all but thirty-five precincts in the state. They give Goebel a net plurality of 841. Ten of the missing precincts are in Democratic counties, and twenty-five are in Republican. In the Courier-Journal's tables, however, are several counties from which its correspondent reported estimated and not actual pluralities.

BANKS ARE INDEPENDENT. Notify the Government They Can Take Care of Themselves.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Reports of possible action by the treasury to relieve the stringency in money market rates in New York excited general comment in banking circles today. Bankers generally agreed that no such crisis as would call for relief measures on the part of Washington authorities had been reached since the banks were able to supply all mercantile demands for money, and that whatever stringency existed was mainly from borrowers who were inclined to speculate on small resources. An officer of one of the banks said: "There is no stringency in supplying the mercantile demand for currency. The country is not inclined to discount paper. For this reason I can see no reason for treasury relief just now. The present demand is from speculators who want to do more, perhaps, than their means justify. Should the way be opened for relieving the situation in that quarter it might result disastrously in the end. New York banks can take care of themselves."


