CYCLISTS ATE WELL

THEY TENDER A BANQUET TO THE CITY AND COUNTY OFFICIALS

GAY SPREAD AT MERCHANTS'

One of the Best Years for Cycling in the Vicinity of the Twin Cities Is Marked Near Its Close by a Delightful Gathering of the Members of the Associated Cycling Organizations.

The country and city officers were banqueted by the Associated Wheelmen of St. Paul at the Merchants' hotel last night. About forty covers were laid, and the table was elaborately decorated for the occasion with cut flowers, with an elaborate centerpiece representing a wheel, covered with chrysanthemums and roses.

The toastmaster was J. E. Meyers, chairman of the committee, and at the head of the table were seated City Comptroller J. J. McCarty, Joseph A. Woodcock, Coroner Nelson and Herman Oppenheim. The first speaker of the evening was Secretary Walter P. Confar, who read a report of the work done by the Associated Wheelmen during the past year, including the taking of the census of wheelmen. Mr. Confar pointed out that the paths for cyclists amount only \$5,000 out of the \$111,000 voted during the year for street improvements in St. Paul. It should be, he thought, at least \$20,000. This amount was due, not as a concession, but as a right.

Archie Mathews, for the Century Road club, explained that the general purpose of the organization he represented was generally misunderstood. It was not alone for the purpose of making hundreds of miles runs, but for good roads and fraternities among wheelmen.

In introducing C. B. Gedney to respond for the Commercial Club Cyclists, the toastmaster paid a high tribute to the aid rendered by the city and county officers in the construction of the cycle path, of which there were now seventy-two miles in Ramsey county.

Coroner J. C. Nelson spoke for the Cycle Path association, which he said, was the pioneer organization of the kind in the country. Its success was largely due to the cooperation of the city and county officers.

SMITH WILL NOT BUY

OWNER OF LEXINGTON PARK ENDS NEGOTIATIONS WITH COMISKEY

NATIONAL LEAGUE MEETING

Deliberations of the Moguls in New York Today Will Probably Clear Up the Doubt in Which the Status of St. Paul as a Baseball Town Is Now Enveloped—May Go Into New League.

Negotiations for the sale of the St. Paul Baseball club and franchise in the American League of Baseball clubs, which have been in the hands of the present owner, Charles A. Comiskey, and E. B. Smith, representing a syndicate of capitalists, came to an end yesterday. Mr. Smith rejecting the final proposition made by Comiskey, and declaring himself unwilling to listen to further propositions from the same source.

This revives the possibility that St. Paul will have a club, as it is not yet clear whether Comiskey will be able to gain the foothold in Chicago he has anticipated, and he may come back to St. Paul to play after all for 1900.

An associated press dispatch last night stated that St. Paul had applied for a franchise in the new Western league, which T. J. Hickey, of St. Joseph, is promoting, but the dispatch failed to state who had applied for the franchise for St. Paul.

A Washington dispatch says: The most feasible scheme to be proposed, according to well grounded information from inside sources, will be the organization of two eight-club leagues, under one national agreement. This plan would be brought about by the sale of franchises to additional prominent cities where strong support can be depended upon, and the equitable division, as near as possible, into two leagues located in practically the same territory.

The four additional cities most desired, and expected to enter such an agreement, are said to be Providence, R. I.; Buffalo, N. Y.; Detroit, Mich.; and Kansas City, Mo. It is anticipated that the league will be transferred to Milwaukee, thus giving sixteen first-class baseball cities, which would be divided in the following manner: Washington, Philadelphia, New York, Providence, Detroit, Pittsburgh, Chicago and Kansas City.

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CHALLENGE TO BRITONS.

It May Be Issued by American College Athletes.

LONDON, Dec. 11.—It is said that possibly the proposed Harvard-Yale-Oxford-Cambridge Easter return meeting in the United States will not be brought off, in which case the Oxford-Cambridge team will have to go to America in July, unless the Harvard-Yale team accept the suggestion that they visit England again and then go to Paris. Nothing is known at either Oxford or Cambridge university in regard to the proposed meeting, but the University of Pennsylvania will meet the team of the English universities while on their way to Paris. The Oxford-Cambridge team has decided not to go to Paris.

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—Inquiries made at Cambridge, Mass., show that the Harvard people think the proposed meet in return for the visit the Americans made in England in July of the present year. Harvard, it was learned, had not done much toward getting the Oxford and Cambridge athletes over, but Yale was said to have been active in the movement. Nothing could be ascertained in regard to the Harvard men going to England. In an interview with the Yale manager Dana, of the Yale team, on the subject he said:

"It is the intention of the Yale-Harvard team to challenge the Englishmen. Negotiations have been opened, but no formal challenge has yet been sent. The time and place have not been decided. It should be, he thought, at least \$20,000. This amount was due, not as a concession, but as a right.

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KENNY NOT IN IT.

Spike Sullivan Easily Defeated the Chicago Boxer.

HAERTFORD, Conn., Dec. 11.—Spike Sullivan got the decision over Young Kenny, the Chicago light weight, in the sixth round in what was scheduled to be a twenty-round bout at 133 pounds, before the Capitol Athletic club, today. Although carefully nursing his recently broken arm Sullivan was the aggressor from the start to finish. He landed at will, frequently carrying the Chicagoan on his feet. In the first round he sent a hard straight left to Kenny's jaw, which the latter never fully recovered. In fact he was never saved from a knock-out by the heavy right hand of Kenny, which he landed in several hard lefts, but the third, fourth and fifth were easily Sullivan's. In the sixth Kenny caught a terrific left on the jaw, which sent him to the floor. The referee stopped the fight, awarding the decision to Sullivan.

SANTRY WAS SWIFT.

Knocked Out Jack O'Falley in Less Than One Minute.

CHICAGO, Dec. 11.—At a benefit given tonight to Frank Garrard, the old-time Chicago light weight, Eddie Santry, the featherweight champion of the world, knocked out Jack O'Falley, an aspiring lightweight from Baltimore, in less than a minute of what was to have been a six-round contest.

In the preliminaries Clarence Forbes, a local bantam, who is slated to meet Steve Flanagan in Chicago next week, knocked out Mickey Riley, a lightweight, of Milwaukee, in the second round. The referee netted nearly \$1,000, which will be turned over to Garrard, who has been seriously sick ever since his return from Cuba, where he served with the Illinois volunteers during the Spanish-American war.

DORING-WITMER MATCH.

At Palm Garden Tomorrow Night Is Growing Interesting.

Much interest is being manifested in the wrestling match to take place at the Palm Garden theater tomorrow evening between Gus Doring and Charles Witmer. Witmer won from Doring a week ago, but Doring thinks he can again retrieve his laurels. The match is at catch-as-catch-can style, two falls in three, for a purse of \$75 and a \$100 side bet. The match will commence promptly at 9 o'clock, in order that it may be concluded, as no draws will be allowed. Capt. Witmer will be referee.

WARZAWIAK MATTER.

Presbytery of New York Will Appeal to General Assembly.

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—The presbytery of New York today discussed for three hours the Warzawiak matter, and then rescinded the action it took in November, when it appointed a committee to try him, and decided to let the matter drop until the spring of the next year. The supreme court of the presbytery has acted upon the matter. The presbytery's action was the result of a strong protest made by Rev. Dr. R. Booth, acting moderator of the presbytery, who appeared before the presbytery and declared that inasmuch as the action appointing a committee was a reflection upon the action of the Fifth Avenue church, the would appeal from anything that had been done to the general assembly and bring up the whole case on its merits.

ONE MAN CONFESSED.

Two More Arrested in the Winthrop Counterfeiting Cases.

BOSTON, Dec. 11.—G. E. Litchfield, a printer, and Porter M. Bliss, a photographer, both of this city, were arrested today, charged with complicity in the recent counterfeiting cases in Winthrop, in connection with which one person is in prison and three persons besides Litchfield and Bliss are under arrest. The men taken into custody today pleaded not guilty, and were held in \$5,000 for appearance Friday.

The arrest of Litchfield and Bliss is an outcome of the Canadian counterfeiting case, which has been under the eye of the United States authorities for two months. George Chisholm, who was arrested in Halifax in October, on charge of passing counterfeit money, and who is now in prison, gave the names of the persons concerned. William J. Dyer and Annie Hubert, a woman who passed as his wife, alleged to be the principals, were arrested a few days ago in Guthrie, Okla., whither they had fled in accordance with their plan to escape. They were arrested last week and Litchfield and Bliss today.

STILLWATER. Messrs. Lowry and Goodrich Inspect Their Line. Messrs. Lowry and Goodrich, owners of the Stillwater street railway line, were in the city yesterday, conferring over on a private car shortly after noon. Their trip was for the purpose of inspection.

Gustaf Brown and Vincent Mills have been recalled at the prison from Steele county, the former to serve one year and six months for burglary, and the latter three years for grand larceny.

And Jacobson and Edward Reddel, convicted of swindling in Douglas county, in the spring of 1898, and sentenced to serve five years each in prison, were liberated Saturday evening, by virtue of pardons granted them by the state board of pardons.

Judge Williston reconvened the fall term of the district court yesterday and the entire day was devoted to the action of John McDonald vs. the City of Stillwater, an action for damages in the sum of \$400.

CUBAN TEACHERS PROTEST.

They Want Better Pay for Their Services.

HAVANA, Dec. 11.—The teachers of Havana have presented a petition to Gen. Brooks in the course of which they say: "It is frequently asserted by Americans that 80 per cent of the Cubans cannot read, and that for this reason they are not fit to govern themselves. It is therefore very important to educate the Cubans; but with the salaries quoted in the recent order it is impossible for the teachers to live. They see with much mortification that salaries in other branches of the public service are being raised, while the salaries of teachers are being lowered. They ask that the salaries of teachers in Havana be fixed at \$124 a month, and in the other principal towns at \$100 a month. There are not eight teachers who know English in the country in the world is a public school teacher required to teach other than his or her own language. If English is to be taught in Cuba, the petitioners request that special teachers be provided, and that all teachers be Cubans or Cuban citizens, except, if necessary, those who are to teach English."

GOVERNOR OF CUBA.

Office to Which Gen. Leonard Wood Will Be Assigned.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—Governor of Cuba will be the official designation of the office to which Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood will be assigned, and early in the new year as the successor to Maj. Gen. Brooke, the present military governor of the island.
