THE ROBERTS CASE.

The brief presented by Congressman-elect Roberts to the special committee having his right to his seat under consideration is in more than one respect a strong document.

Roberts' case is being disposed of in the white heat of public passion and prejudice. The arguments advanced to sustain the summary action of congress in refusing to recognize even his prima facie right to his seat are all tinged heavily with the colors of popular clamor.

There are certain qualifications prescribed by the constitution, as to age and citizenship, the possession of which on its face, backed by a due certificate of election, has always been recognized as creating the prima facie right of the member-elect to his seat, subject to the future action of the house on any contest made.

The right given by the constitution to each house to be "judge of the election returns and qualifications of its own members" does not carry with it the right to exclude a member-elect from his seat without any reference to such returns or qualifications, as has been done in this case.

Third—It further appears that the crime alleged against the representative from Utah is not a crime, and that the qualification for a member of congress is not to be assessed by the right to add to the qualifications prescribed by the constitution of the United States.

The right to be heard on the question of the ultimate right of Roberts to hold the seat. That he probably could not do in any event. But it does protest against the irregular and arbitrary procedure adopted toward him thus far.

Whether Rome of old was ever comparable with St. Paul of today is a question which may be left for decision to the great historical scholar who at present holds down the job of clerk of the Minnesota state supreme court.

WOOD, THE RIGHT MAN.

The best earnest which the president could have given of the sincerity of his declarations in his message regarding the future of Cuba is afforded by the elevation of Gen. Wood to the rank of major general.

Coming immediately after the adoption of Gen. Wood's recommendation in favor of the withdrawal of American troops from the island it must remove all fears from the minds of the Cuban people as to the purpose of this government toward the future control of Cuba by its own people.

No man associated with the advance of affairs in that island since the evacuation by the Spaniards is regarded as embodying in anything like the same degree the qualifications necessary to make smooth and easy the transition of the Cuban nation from the condition of a ward state to that of a self-governing, sovereign people.

There will be danger neither of delay nor precipitancy in making the transition with Gen. Wood at the head of affairs. His long experience on the ground. His experience in civil life makes him much more available than if he were trained from his young manhood to the pursuit of arms.

With Gen. Wood's appointment as governor of Cuba the American people will rest entirely content to await any length of time he may indicate as proper before the final steps are taken for the establishment of the young republic of Cuba.

GERMANY, A NAVAL POWER.

The remarkable success in the German rechristening on Tuesday are an indication of the difficulties which lie in the path of the militant young ruler of the German empire. He will rule as a war lord.

The naval bill of the emperor will become a law, just as every other radical recommendation of his in civil or military affairs has been sooner or later adopted. And it is essential to German greatness that it should so become.

The career which the young emperor points out to the German people is a consistent one. He would have the might of commerce, as well as the might of soldiers and sailors, behind Germany. As a colonizing race the history of the German people is yet young.
