WEARIED OF HIS LIFE

DANIEL MOLLETON COMMITS SUICIDE WITH SOLUTION OF CYANIDE OF POTASSIUM

SAID HE WRONGED HIS WIFE

Had Exhibited Signs of Dementia at the Union Depot, and Was in Consequence Arrested, but Subsequently Released—in a Letter Which He Left He Said He Considered Himself a Useless Article.

Daniel Molleton, a foreigner, whose mind was evidently unbalanced, committed suicide at noon yesterday at the home of Patrolman John Harris, 428 East Seventh street, by swallowing a solution of cyanide of potassium. Although the suicide left a letter referring to his intention to take his own life there is considerable mystery surrounding the man which the police have been unable to unravel.

Another letter, from Albert Hansen, manufacturer of diamond jewelry, of Seattle, contained an offer to Molleton of employment at his trade at the rate of \$4 per day.

Among the other articles found in the pocket of the suicide was an ordinary leather memorandum book. On the first page, under the cover, was the name of St. Paul, Minn. Just above the inscription was a clipping from a Minneapolis newspaper of recent date, from an article on Moody, the recently deceased evangelist.
