MAY CUT SOME SALARIES.

County Commissioners Have Some Reductions in Contemplation.

The committee on public accounts of the board of county commissioners held a protracted session yesterday, with the view of settling the salaries of the employees of the several offices.

There will be no changes in the office of the register of deeds, with the exception of the salary of the bookkeeper, W. J. Elliott, whose salary is cut from \$100 to \$75 a month. In the office of the county treasurer it was decided to make only one change, and a wrangle took place over the reduction in the salary of a clerk to the extent of \$5 a month. A majority and a minority report will be submitted regarding the clerical work in the treasurer's office at tomorrow's meeting of the board. A lively contention is also on relative to the salaries in the office of County Attorney Reed. The friends of Mr. Hutchinson, now the second assistant, claim that he should be given the salary now received by Mr. Pulliam. On the other hand, Pulliam's friends insist that he shall keep his present position and draw the same salary, and there is likely to be a merry row.

TWO MASS MEETINGS.

Minneapolis Anti-Imperialists Will Hold Them Jan. 27.

The anti-imperialists of Minneapolis are arranging to hold two mass meetings Jan. 27, one in Normanna and the other in Dania hall. The anti's hope they will be able to secure John R. Altgeld for the principal speaker, and also that Father Cleary will make an address. It is their

intention to have each of the speakers talk in both halls. While one is in the Normanna, the other will be in the Dania.

A meeting of the anti-imperialists at the state university was held in the chapel yesterday afternoon. After some discussion a committee, with Prof. Harlow Gale at its head, was appointed to draw up a constitution. This committee will report at a meeting to be held one week later and will also report on some plan of action. The plan of those who are behind the plan is to unite all in the "U" who are in any way opposed to the expansion and to make a thorough study of the question.

Russians Held the Last Service Under Julian Calendar Yesterday.

Halsten was twenty-five years of age, a single man, and his parents reside in Seattle.
