The St. Paul Curling club held a point contest yesterday afternoon in which Frank McCarthy piled up a score of 45, only two lower than the club record. The average of scores was high, and some very interesting work was seen on the ice. The rinks were in excellent condition, with keen interest and challenges for good work. The scores were: F. McCarthy, 45; S. E. Fullerton, 38; T. Pratt, 34; H. W. Cory, 34; W. Stewart, 32; W. Murray, 32; L. Doherty, 31; W. Morrison, 27; D. C. Murray, 25; James Ross, 25; J. Hennessy, 18; and J. Houska, 18.

A silver medal goes to Mr. McCarthy for his score. It was presented by L. Deffen, and will be held during the intervening periods between contests, going successively to high man.

There will be a meeting this noon at the Windsor hotel, at which a number of curlers will discuss the advisability of sending other rinks.
