NEWS OF RAILROADS

THROUGH BILLING OF FREIGHT WILL ADOPT MANY ANNOYANCES TO SHIPPERS

NORTHERN PACIFIC IN LINE

New System is Now in Effect and Will be Followed Hereafter—Result in More Expeditious Handling of Freight—Change is Regarded as Very Important to Jobbers and Other Business Men.

The Northern Pacific announces that arrangements have been completed for through billing of freight for all points in the clearing house roads' territory west of Puyallup.

The new system is now in effect and will be followed hereafter. It will do away with repeated annoyances to shippers and the railroads, and will result in the more expeditious handling of freight.

The danger of overcharges is done away with by the new method of handling shipments. Each road in the past has taken out what it considered its fair share of the freight rate, and mistakes in computation have frequently compelled shippers to advance more than should have been charged.

CANADIAN CAPITAL

Will Build the Manitoba & Southwestern Railroad. Secretary Berg yesterday received a telegram from one of the officers of the new Manitoba & Southwestern railroad, informing him that the line has been completed as far as Warroad.

Mr. Berg stated yesterday that the road will be built with a little delay as possible to Port Arthur. Several hundred miles have already been built west of Winnipeg through the present winter.

MAKE GOOD TIME

Snow Blockades Have Been Unusually Light This Winter. The Northern Pacific overland struck stormy weather in Montana Tuesday, and was delayed an hour and a half in arriving in the city yesterday afternoon.

The Wisconsin Central afternoon express from Chicago was delayed an hour and five minutes. Other delays during the day were unimportant. The morning entering the city have had unusually good luck so far this winter and snow blockades of any importance have been missing.

BROKERS WERE EXCITED

One of Their Number Appointed a Regular Ticket Agent. An inspection of the new January fold-

er of the Soo line shows that a member of the Ticket Brokers' Association, C. L. Becker, has been appointed a regular passenger agent of the line at Aberdeen, S. D. The name is included in the latest folder of the brokers' association and the fact of Becker's appointment is taken as an indication that the recent action of the brokers in combining for the Soo's benefit has been favorably considered.

APPEAL TO MORGAN

Chicago Board of Trade Men Allege Rate Discrimination. CHICAGO, Feb. 14.—A committee of the Chicago Board of Trade has sent an open letter to J. Pierpont Morgan, as "the foremost representative of the financial and railroad interests," calling attention to the fact that the Interstate Commerce law on the part of the railroads, and asking him to use his influence in remedying them.

SPOTTERS WERE ACTIVE

So Far as Learned No Contraband Tickets Were Found. Chairman McLeod, of the Western Passenger association, was in Minneapolis yesterday making a report on the results of his trip to Chicago to investigate the spot market for tickets on the Chicago and North Western lines.

Northern Pacific officials state that the action of the road in reducing the rate on three cents a mile in line with the rate on the Great Northern and the Duluth & St. Louis lines, is a reduction of high tariffs.

The Duluth & St. Louis City, part of the Duluth & St. Louis line, earned \$10,331 on its line across the southwestern part of the state during the year. Taxes at 3 per cent amounted to \$309.62.

GROSS EARNINGS OF ROADS

The Northern Pacific has filed a gross earnings report with the railroad commission, showing that the main line in Minnesota earned \$2,200,000 last year. Branches earned a comfortable sum on which the tax is \$4,692, at 3 per cent.

Talked East-Bound Situation

General Passenger Agent C. E. McPherson, of the western district of the Canadian Pacific system, is in the city yesterday. Mr. McPherson's headquarters are in the Duluth. It is understood that the object of his visit was to confer with Soo Line officials and Chairmen of the Western Passenger Association, with reference to the east-bound situation.

Romey Depot Case

The Romey depot case came up before the railroad commission yesterday. The town was represented by a local attorney, and the case was argued by the other party in the case, by Vice President Miller and General Passenger Agent McPherson. St. Louis, presented the argument for the Romey delegation.

Telegraph Line Ownership

Evidence was taken by the railroad commission yesterday afternoon in the case of the ownership of the telegraph lines of the Great Northern to determine the ownership of certain telegraph lines. The case was argued by the Western Passenger Association, with reference to the east-bound situation.

Death of Freight Agent Miller

LINCOLN, Neb., Feb. 14.—Richard P. R. Miller, general freight agent of the Missouri Pacific railroad at Lincoln, was aged sixty-six years, and died at his home in Lincoln, Neb., yesterday afternoon. He was a well-known and well-liked man in the city.

Burlington Dividend

BOSTON, Feb. 14.—The directors of the Burlington Railroad Company yesterday declared a regular dividend of 1 1/2 per cent.

RAILROADS PAYING TAXES

Over a Quarter of a Million Dollars the Amount of One Day's Work at the State House—Was a Record-Breaker—Northern Pacific Starts the Ball With a Check for \$186,000.

State Treasurer Koerner did a land office business yesterday and expects the rush to continue for several days, as the railroad companies are contributing their share of the public tax just now, and a considerable amount is still due from this source. Over \$250,000 was paid into the state's exchequer yesterday, which, with the exception of a check for \$25,556.02 from the university, the entire amount comes from railroad companies as tax upon their gross earnings for 1899.
