WHERE PEOPLE COME AND GO

Localities Frequented by Men and Women of All Classes and Occupations—Big Stores Attract Crowds—A Multum in Parvo Building—Something of St. Paul's Diversified Interests.

Probably no other city in the Northwest furnishes more varied or interesting street scenes in the business district than does St. Paul. Considering its population and area it has an extraordinarily large business center. The retail business district covers a territory more than half a mile square, and the city has many kinds of retail trade that may not be seen elsewhere.

One of the most interesting street intersections in the city is that of Seventh and Wabasha. This location, especially in all parts of the year save winter, is the Mecca for the thrifty housekeeper who does her own buying for the table and wants to make the selections in person in order to get the benefit of advertised sale prices.

SHIFTING THE SCENE. Two blocks south, or toward the river, the student of street scenes will find another sort of center. It is that of which the postoffice is the center. Here the men are more numerous, and the class of women encountered is more mixed.

LOOK HERE FOR STRANGERS. Fifth and Robert streets is an intersection at which more strangers or visitors may be seen than at any other. This applies to the floating and business element of the visiting class.

SEVENTH AND ROBERT STREETS. Considered at all times, from 9 o'clock in the morning until 5 o'clock in the afternoon, this section is the most interesting. Three of the corners are occupied by the most extensive clothing and furnishing retail establishments in the city.

Microbes Removed From Milk.

NEW MACHINE WHICH WILL EFFECT THE DESIRED RESULT WITHOUT INJURY TO THE FLUID. The problem of the purification of milk seems to have been solved by a machine which takes microbes out of milk as a net takes fish out of water. Tests made at the New York Post-Graduate hospital, been a flaw in every one of them. That there is no flaw in the new device seems to be borne out both by the laboratory tests and by the fact that the machine is being put in service by the big dairies, which are not given to experiments.



Microbes removed from milk. The machine is a separator. It utilizes the marvelous power latent in centrifugal force. Reduced to its simplest terms, this is the way the machine works: The milk is allowed to fall into a vessel that is revolving at a tremendous rate of speed. So great is the speed and so powerful the pressure that the stream of milk rises up the sides of the vessel in whirling waves and issues from the turmoil almost the same spot at which it entered the vessel. By the power of centrifugal force all the impurities, all the microbes and all the germs are precipitated to the bottom and held there by the same centrifugal force that keeps water in a pail even when it is swung in circles over a man's head.

FOR HUNGRY PEOPLE.

Soda Water Prescribed as a "Fitter" for Abnormal Appetite. Carbonic acid gas, says a medical authority, has the singular property of lessening the sense of hunger, and may profitably be remembered in dealing with cases of diabetes in which bulimia is a prominent symptom. The seat of hunger is found in the solar plexus. By the use of water charged with carbonic acid

choline will find its chief use. To what extent germs—and dangerous germs, at that—are present in milk was shown the other day at the New York Post-Graduate hospital. Eighty quarts of good standard milk were obtained and run through the machine. The sludge which remained in the bottom of the machine after the work was done was scraped out and sent to the Institute of Chemistry, Pathology and Bacteriology to be tested. In one cubic centimeter of this residue 27,500,000 microbes were found. A cubic centimeter of liquid, it may be said, is about five drops.

gas the branches of the solar plexus distributed through the mucous membrane of the stomach are influenced in such a way that the abnormal irritation of the plexus, which is the foundation for the ravenous hunger often present in diabetes and certain forms of indigestion, may be greatly mitigated, if not wholly appeased. Water charged with carbonic acid gas may likewise be employed with advantage in many cases of hyperpepsia in which there is a sensation present in the stomach described by the patient as a gnawing "goneness."
