
The Republicans Ready for Tonight's Caucus—Looks Good for Schiffmann—Popular Name Some Candidates.

FILES SUIT FOR \$60,000

ACTION BY A MICHIGAN CONCERN AGAINST JOHN P. SIMS.

The Vermillion Pine and Iron company has brought a suit for \$60,000 against John P. Sims, manager of the Itasca Lumber company, of Minneapolis. The suit has been filed in the federal court at St. Paul. Sims bought a large tract of timber land in Itasca county in 1892. Sims bought a portion of this land for the company selling the tract at this price on the amount of \$60,000. The cruder represented there was 1,500,000 feet of timber and there was between 20,000,000 and 30,000,000 feet of timber. Sims has sold the timber and the Michigan law prohibits a corporation from selling real estate except when authorized by three-fourths of the stockholders.

ORIGIN OF A PATENT MEDICINE TRADE-MARK.

I sat at the breakfast table; breakfast had been eaten and the morning paper had been read. My mind took the idea of an advertisement for the new medicine. I took my pencil from my pocket and marked "RIPANS" on the margin of the Times about as here represented: I then took from my pocket a ten-cent piece and placing it over the a circle about as here shown. That there was an excellent opportunity for making the second word interlace with the first. It was quite natural at this point to apply the ten-cent piece and describe another arc of a circle, as is here shown. I then, while studying upon the unpromising result thus coin as at first, and nearly shown. What more natural should be to treat the arc in the same way. I was without any factory results. Again myself applying the coin mechanically and the result is here shown. What more natural than at this point to mechanically fill up the vacant spaces with pencil marks, as are for the fact that I traced these.
