## Descendant of John Alden.....


A short time ago a Chicago paper printed the picture of a youngster, one Robert Redfield Jr., aged two years, two months, claiming for him the distinction of being

The baby's name is Robert Van Norden Hine, son of Judge and Mrs. R. C. Hine, of this city. He was born in St. Paul, May 22, 1899. Though his mother he is descended from John and Priscilla Alden, of Plymouth, Mass. His great great grandfather on her side was one of the original founders of the Shaker society at Lebanon, N. Y. His great great grandfather on his father's side was a major in a New Jersey regiment in the Revolutionary war. Another of his great grandfathers fought in that war under Benedict Arnold; so the baby comes of a good old Puritan stock, a stock that has fashioned many a hero.

There may be some who will claim that John Alden himself was slightly wanting in courage, but history records only one occasion when he was backward about speaking for himself—and then—well, there were extenuating circumstances. His nine months' old descendant will probably never have to tremble even one occasion when he was backward about speaking for himself.

It is not a falling of the colonial pioneer's today! Ancestors of American descendants, a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution who attended the national congress held recently in Washington, relates as an interesting coincidence that at a meeting of the Mayflower, a society composed of all those who can trace their descent from an ancestor who came over in that historic boat, a lineal descendant of Miles Standish led into the banquet a lineal descendant of Priscilla Alden.
