PHYSICIANS ARE INTERESTED IN THE DEATH OF CHRISTIAN BUCKA

AUTOPSY DISCLOSES LITTLE

To Throw Light on the Sudden Death of the Young Man Who Was Recently Vaccinated.

The autopsy held yesterday on the body of Christian Bucka, the sixteen-year-old schoolboy who died under peculiar circumstances within a short time after submitting to vaccination, failed to definitely disclose the cause of death.

Young Bucka was vaccinated against the wishes of his parents. He was told by the principal of the Monroe school that he must be vaccinated or he could not remain in his class.

In support of the hydrophobia theory it is pointed out that about a year ago Bucka was bitten by a dog. Dr. Cavanaugh attended him then, cauterizing the wound and taking every precaution against rabies.
