The resignation of Miss Kiehl as a physical director, was accepted and a committee appointed to choose a successor.

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THE HAT THAT HAD GUILT. EFFECTIVE REPUTATION OF THE STATEMENT THAT JOE HURST CONFESSED.

LETTER OF DENIAL IN FULL. It Was Found Immediately After the Execution in the Cell the Condemned Man Had Occupied.

WADENA, Minn., April 5.—(Special.)—Joe Hurst, who was hanged at Glendive, Mont., last Friday, was born here, and his parents are now and always have been highly respected residents of this place.

He was convicted of the murder of Sheriff Dominick Cavanaugh, of Glendive, on circumstantial evidence, and as his record was without blemish a mighty effort was made to secure executive clemency.

But the granting of his plea, was not convinced of his guilt. The statement that he confessed guilt before execution to a minister of the Gospel is refuted by the following letter which was found in his cell immediately after the execution:

"I feel that it is my duty to say a few words in my own behalf. I did not try to get the vacant office of Mr. Cavanaugh's death, and I don't nor never did deny it.
