





Republican Misrule Is to Be Ended When the Month of June Is Unheralded In.

The Democrats of the Fifth ward turned out en masse last night to a meeting in Kirk's hall, 547 West Seventh street, for the purpose of organization. John J. Kelly was elected chairman and Lee W. Dohm secretary of the meeting. It was unanimously resolved that the "Fifth Ward Democratic club" be the name adopted for this organization.

After the enrollment of members, William H. Ulmer was called upon for a speech. Mr. Ulmer spoke briefly, but to the point and proposed to spare neither his time nor efforts to put the Fifth ward back under Democratic rule, where it does of right belong.

Mr. Ulmer was followed by Philip Martin, Democratic candidate for assemblyman, who made a rousing address. He said, in part: "For what does the Democratic party stand? For freedom of conscience, speech and thought; for liberation from the gold standard and from the Moloch of trusts and monopolies. It was the spirit of Democracy that founded this republic, and Democracy alone can preserve our institutions intact for the future."
