CLAIMS AT CAPE NOME

MR. NELSON, OF MINNESOTA, DEFENDS MEN WHO ARE NOT AMERICANS BY BIRTH WERE TO BECOME CITIZENS

That Was Sufficient to Entitle Them to Consideration, Be They Swedes, Norwegians or Laplanders.

WASHINGTON, April 18.—During almost the entire session of the senate today the Alaskan civil code bill was under consideration.

In this connection Mr. Stewart (Nev.) delivered an address of nearly three hours upon the mining law of the United States and their relation to the proposed amendment of Mr. Hansbrough as to the rights of alien locators of claims.

Mr. Nelson (Minn.), Mr. Carter (Mont.) and Mr. Teller (Col.) discussed the pending amendment at length, both Mr. Nelson and Mr. Teller being particularly vigorous in their denunciation of it.

Mr. Nelson sustained the rights of the so-called alien miners located the mining claims in question.

Mr. Hansbrough interrupted Mr. Nelson to read a paragraph from a document drawn by the "law and order league" of the Cape Nome district, which declared that the people who Mr. Nelson said had located the claims were not really the locators of the claims.

In reply Mr. Nelson said that the laws had come to call things by their correct names. He denounced the "law and order league" as an organization formed to jump claims located by honest prospectors.

Continuing Mr. Nelson said the claimants in the Cape Nome district were all either declared citizens of the United States or people who honestly had intended to become citizens of the United States.

Mr. Tiller (Col.) agreed with Mr. Nelson in what he had said of the rights of the Swedes, Norwegians, Laplanders and Finns, and speaking of the Hansbrough amendment, said that the senators ought to take it by the name of the neck and kick it out of the senate.
