In Labor's Field.

Yesterday saw an improvement in the situation of the woodworkers' strike. About 9 o'clock in the morning the St. Paul Furniture Company signed the agreement, and eighty men went back to work.

The company reserves the right to buy and sell goods which they do not manufacture, but this provision does not interfere with the principles of the union.

The Alton Building company has also signed this agreement, and the men have gone back there as well.

There are still four firms holding out. These are the Bohn Manufacturing Company, the St. Paul Sash, Door and Lumber Company, the Gribbin Lumber Company and the Villama Company.

Of the 20 who went out when the strike was declared there are now only fifty who are not employed, a number of those who have not gone back having found work at other unions.

The report of the financial secretary showed the receipts for April to be \$300 and expenditures \$284.
