

**WOMEN'S CLUBS AT WORK**  
 OPENING SESSIONS OF THE MEETINGS AT MILWAUKEE ARE LARGELY ATTENDED  
 TWO QUESTIONS PROMINENT  
 Who Shall Be President, and Shall the Color Line Be Drawn—Interesting Debates Anticipated.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., June 5.—Nothing could have been more auspicious than the formal opening of the fifth biennial convention of the general Federation of Women's clubs this morning. The Alhambra theater, which seats 2,000, was crowded to its doors. Following the addresses of welcome by David S. Rose, mayor of Milwaukee; Mrs. James Sidney Peck, on behalf of the women's clubs of Milwaukee, and Mrs. Arthur C. Neville, for the state. Mrs. Lowe, the federation president, delivered her biennial address.

 Mrs. Urquhart Lee, Mrs. A. B. Howe, Mrs. H. Winslow, Mrs. L. W. Morgan, Mrs. Lowe, of Georgia, who was enthusiastically received when she stepped to the front of the platform, and evidence of the support which the ladies have for her reelection to the presidency.

When the convention opened, the hall was crowded to the topmost gallery, the audience numbering at least 2,000. It was noticeable that the Massachusetts delegation was conspicuous for its absence, it being engaged in a caucus over their colored delegate. It is believed there will be a protest this afternoon when the credentials' committee makes its report, and the name of Mrs. Josephine Ruffin, of New York, as a delegate from the New Era Club of Boston.

There was a ripple of political talk when it was said this morning that Mrs. Lowe's supporters in the South wished to put up for the presidency Miss Helen Whittier of Lowell, Mass., but Miss Whittier promptly declined. The Southern women now say they will project no candidate, and have not as yet decided where it will place their support.
