THE WOMAN TO DEFEAT

EFFORT TO REORGANIZE THE GENERAL FEDERATION OF WOMEN'S CLUBS.

TWO HUNDRED AGAINST IT

Animated Scenes in the Convention During the Final Debate Upon the Question—Election Today.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., June 7.—After one of the most spirited sessions ever held by the general Federation of Women's clubs, the long-discussed question of re-organization was defeated today by a vote of 483 to 285.

Mrs. James Daw, president of the Western New York federation, offered an amendment to the minority report of the reorganization committee, making provision for state organizations that did not wish to connect themselves with state federations.

The debate was finally closed by Mrs. Brock of Pennsylvania, chairman of the reorganization committee, who is the champion of the minority report, and though she made a most favorable impression, the minority report was lost in the vote which was finally called by a majority of 285 to 483.

Color Question.

Though the board of directors met this afternoon the color question was not taken from the table.

She was given an ovation, Mrs. Lowe herself leading with the chaperon salute. The memorial was read in session, with Mrs. Corinne S. Brown, of Chicago, as chairman.

Other sectional meetings were devoted to "divas" with Mrs. Herron, of Cincinnati, in the chair. The "divas" were Mrs. Thompson, of the Nobie, of Norfolk, Conn., "The Common Sense of Domestic Science," with Mrs. Annie G. Whitmore, of Denver, chairman.

HOME RECEPTIONS.

These sessions were followed by a series of eleven elaborate receptions in as many Milwaukee homes.

This evening at the Alhambra theater one of the chief interests of the federation, the work of the Consumer League, was presented by Mrs. Sarah Platt-Decker, of Denver.

Mrs. Frederick Nathan, president of the New York Consumers' league, spoke of "The Power and Responsibility of the Consumer." The speaker was Mrs. New York, secretary of the National Consumers' league.

Plans for future work were presented by Mrs. Corinne S. Brown, of Chicago.

A new work in which the club women take lively interest is municipal art, which was presented in its practical phases by Mr. George Krieh, Ph. D., of Chicago, who spoke of "Municipal Art in America."

As the only man on the entire program he will not be tentatively, and so much interest was aroused that there is no doubt municipal art will be further espoused by women's clubs.

The chairman was Mrs. Herman Hall, of Chicago.
