HERMAN W. KLAGES IS INSTANTLY KILLED AT GLEUK'S BREWERY LEAPED FROM THE STEEL ARCH

Unknown Man Committed Suicide Shortly Before Noon by Jumping Into the River—Memorial to Rest.

GLEUK'S MINNEAPOLIS OFFICE, 20 WASHINGTON AV. SOUTH. Herman W. Klages, engineer at Gleuk's brewery, 202 Marshall street northeast, was instantly killed by coming in contact with a live electric light wire about 6 o'clock last evening.
