GRAND LODGE BUSINESS

ODD FELLOWS AND REBEKAHS EXPEDITE AFFAIRS AT YESTERDAY'S SESSION. EXPECT TO FINISH TODAY. Both Orders Show Growth and Prosperity in the Past Year-Attend Northfield Dedication Tomorrow.

What promises to be a very successful grand lodge meeting of the Odd Fellows of the state and Daughters of Rebekahs convened yesterday in the legislative halls. The ladies held forth in the senate chamber and state officials occupying the ante rooms as offices were shut out of their own sanctuaries and several held themselves to the country for a fishing trip.

The first business in order this morning before the Odd Fellows' grand lodge will be the election of grand warden. A vote was taken the first of the year and all offices with the exception of this one were filled. Three candidates are in the field, Messrs. French, of Monticello; McGregor, of Minneapolis, and Harkins, of Long Prairie.

Grand Representative Van Deman occupied half an hour at the opening of the afternoon session yesterday, explaining the Florida sanitarium, maintained for Odd Fellows who visit Florida in search of health. The matter of voting pecuniary assistance to the institution was referred to a committee. A report from the committee on appeals was received and adopted. A lengthy report was made by the committee on by-laws. A number of changes were authorized. A resolution was passed expressing regret at the departure of Past Grand Master George W. French, of this city, and recording appreciation of his civic services in the interest of the order.

At the morning session the grand lodge degree was conferred on a large number of new delegates to the national convention. Grand Master Gamble, in his annual report, told of the institution of fourteen new subordinate lodges and five Rebekah lodges during the year. Nine duplicate charters were issued and five new halls were dedicated during the year. During his term Grand Master Gamble visited fifty-three lodges, instituted eight subordinate lodges, attended a number of dedications, three consolidations, and many other events.

He recommends that the grand lodge take under advisement a proposition to reduce the admission fee for candidates from \$20 to \$15. Also that each subordinate lodge require the reading of the constitution in open lodge at least once each term.

The report of the grand representatives showed a total membership in subordinate lodges Dec. 31 last of \$29,801. The Rebekahs number 190,007. This shows a net gain of 18,041 during the year for the subordinate lodges and 12,184 Rebekahs, a total gain of 30,225 for the calendar year.

These figures cover the growth of the order in the whole United States. The report of Grand Secretary Bolton shows that for Minnesota the number of lodges Dec. 31 last was 239, with a membership of 15,067. The receipts of the lodges for the year aggregated \$178,011.71, and the expenses \$152,040.11. Sick benefits were paid to the amount of \$35,450.50 while \$2,533.87 were for the relief of widows and orphans. Funeral expenses amounted \$4,087.70, and special cases \$4,720.71.
