

REPLY TO RAILWAY COMMISSION'S INQUIRY A BIT SARCASTIC

THAT BODY NOT SATISFIED

Referred the Answer to Its Attorney, and Action is Expected—Further Changes in N. P. Officials.

After all the principal facts concerning the transfer of the St. Paul & Duluth had become public property the Northern Pacific answered the communication of the railway commission asking for details of the consolidation plans.

Your communication of June 7 to this company inquiring about a supposed consolidation of the St. Paul Duluth and Northern Pacific Railway companies has been referred to me. In answer, I beg to advise you that the fall and winter property of the St. Paul & Duluth has been conveyed to the Northern Pacific Railway company by a deed dated June 15.

This deed was duly authorized according to law by vote of the directors of the St. Paul & Duluth and by a majority of over two-thirds of the stockholders of that company.

I am unable to advise you, because the matter has not yet been settled, what changes will be made in the official force resulting from this conveyance.

So little of what was asked has been furnished by the Northern Pacific that the reply of the chief counsel of that road practically amounts to action ignoring the demand for information.

The railway commission will hold a meeting today, at which Gen. Childs will be present, to further consider the matter and decide what steps shall be taken.
