TWO BOYS ARE DROWNED.

SAD ACCIDENT YESTERDAY AT ST. CLOUD DARKENS TWO HOMES.

LAD IS SEIZED WITH CRAMPS. While He Is in Convulsions His Comrade Tries to Save Him, and Both Go Down to Death.

ST. CLOUD, June 25.—(Special.)—While swimming in the river under the Great Northern bridge here today, Leo Rutt and Charles Thines were drowned. Both boys were about eleven years of age and they went swimming together early in the afternoon.

No one else was present when the drowning occurred, but cries for help led to inquiry and a search of the river, after the finding of their clothes on the bank, resulted in the revealing of young Thines' body. Rutt's body has not been recovered.

It is supposed that Thines was seized with cramps and that Rutt, in trying to save his comrade, was carried down into the water. When the body was found, it was seen that Thines' tongue was bitten nearly off, corroborating the theory of cramps.

However, when the high point was reached and increased offerings caused the market to react, September dropped back to \$1.54 and closed at \$1.56, net gain of 5 1/2c for the day.
