GOV. LIND BLAMES RED LIQUOR FOR THE INDIAN SCARE

WAS DEPENDENCY OF CAUSE JOHN O'TOOLE TOOK A FATAL DOSE OF LAUDA-NUM

RETurnS FROM COUNTY ATTORNEYS SHOW LESS THAN FOR 1898

RAMSEY SHOWS NO MURDERS Two Manslaughter Cases Were Its Most Serious Crimes—Minneapolis Also Shows Improvement.

County attorneys from all over Minnesota have filed with Attorney General Douglas reports of the number of cases tried and convicted or acquitted, as the case may be, for last year.

John O'Toole, who for the past ten years has been stopping at the Minneapolis house, 45 Minnesota street, yesterday morning at 11 o'clock took an ounce of laudanum, and was dead an hour later.

Shortly after taking the poison in his room O'Toole was discovered by an employee of the house. The police were at once notified and removed O'Toole to the city hospital, but his life could not be saved.

O'Toole is a moulder, and had been until recently employed in Duluth. He came here about ten days ago, and had since been depending on the house for support.

On his person were found some papers, one of which is a certificate of insurance, and another a certificate of membership in the Moulders' union that showed him to be in good standing with that organization.

He leaves two sons and a wife. One of his sons is employed in the mechanical department of the Daily News, and left here Saturday to visit his mother in Brooklyn. The other is on the warship Brooklyn, and served in the recent war with Spain. O'Toole was fifty-five years of age.
