MILWAUKEE, Wis., July 12.—The grand circuit races of the N. C. A. in connection with the national L. A. THREATENED WITH BLACKLIST.

Rowdy Ball Players Warned by Chief of Umpires Day.

NEW YORK, July 12.—John B. Day, chief of umpires of the National Baseball league, has sent to the players of the league the following circular letter, which is evidently the result of recent criticism concerning the conduct of the players.

"As the playing season has reached its meridian, and as in past seasons players were most unbecomingly and disgracefully in the latter half of the season, I wish again to caution league players that they would be subject to discipline by the league. The conditions are such, though possibly not known to all players, that should charges be preferred against a player and substantiated, the league would indicate such punishment upon the player as would clear its skirts of the humiliation it has suffered through the conduct of such players. If the case should be an aggravated one, I would not be at all surprised if the blacklist is resorted to."

"It was this line of reasoning that induced me to caution players so strongly before the season began, and which causes me to again urge them to lead any such possibility."
