JURY AWARDED HIM \$2,100

The counsel for the defendant moved that, notwithstanding the verdict, judgment should be entered for the defendant, and Judge Amidon granted the motion and ordered judgment.

Coal Companies at Odds

Judge Amidon and a jury in the United States district court yesterday rendered a verdict in the case of the Chesapeake and Ohio Fuel Company against the Northwestern Fuel Company...

The contract set out in the complaint is for 50,000 net tons, inch and a-half and one-half, and red and white lump coal, at \$1.90 per net ton.

The defendant claims that there was a reduction of 25 cents per ton made by the plaintiff from the contract price, and that, therefore, the coal has been fully paid for.

Head of Milwaukee's Passenger Department to Quit Railroading

TO BECOME A STOCK BROKER

The Company's Failure to Advance Him Has Been a Surprise to His Friends.

There is probably more truth in the rumors from Chicago concerning the resignation of George H. Heafford than officials of the Milwaukee road will admit.

Mr. Heafford has been the practical head of the passenger department of that system for eighteen years and to his skill and popularity, in a great measure, the success of the company in the passenger business is undoubtedly attributable.

While it has not been announced, it is generally believed that Mr. Heafford leaves the railroad business to engage in stock brokerage on the Chicago market.

Many of Mr. Heafford's friends in and out of the railroad business were greatly surprised that he was not advanced to a higher position at the time of the recent changes in the executive officers of the Milwaukee road, and there were two reasons given at the time why he was not advanced.

One was that officials above him would not consent to his removal from the passenger department, believing they would be unable to replace him, and the other that at that time Mr. Heafford already had the matter in mind of leaving the railroad business and was undecided as to what course he would pursue.

There is no general passenger agent more widely or more favorably known East or West than George H. Heafford, and the loss of his services is bound to be felt. He has accomplished more than the work of a lifetime in the service of the Milwaukee, entering its employ from the office of assistant general passenger agent of the Missouri Pacific railroad. In 1883, when the general offices of the Milwaukee were removed from Milwaukee to Chicago, he was promoted to the office of assistant general passenger agent of the Missouri Pacific railroad.
