

ALLIES MUST HASTEN

MINISTERS CAN ONLY BE RESCUED BY THEIR OWN FORCES

CHINESE NOT TRUSTWORTHY

OFFERS TO ESCORT LEGATIONERS TO TIEN TSIN NOT ENTER-TAINED

CONGER MAY NOT GET MESSAGE

Government Authorities Are Not Convinced Their Cipher Communications Are Transmitted to the Minister in Peking.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—In the light of the latest dispatch from Minister Conger, received by the state department through Minister Wu today, the attitude of the administration is that there is but one thing to be done in the present circumstances, namely, to press on to the relief of the beleaguered garrison at Peking.

The Conger dispatch was received before daylight at the Chinese legation, and as soon as the official day opened Minister Wu presented it to Acting Secretary Adee, at the state department. It was in the American cipher and was found to be an identical note with that of the other ministers at Peking.

The discussion with the president led to the determination to reply to the Conger message at once and accordingly Secretary Root and Acting Secretary Adee conferred on the terms of this reply.

As the terms of the message, they are believed to make plain that this government will not advise, much less direct, that Mr. Conger leave Peking under Chinese escort when the minister has advised Washington that he would mean certain death.

There is no probability that the attention of the Chinese government will be directed to its apparent double dealing, as indicated by the Conger dispatch. This government has transmitted to the other powers interested the note to the Chinese government entrusted to Minister Wu on the night of the 7th.

MESSAGES MAY NOT REACH CONGER

While the state department is continuing to dispatch messages to the Chinese government on the assurance of the Chinese government that communication is uninterrupted, it is doing so with comparative small hope of their delivery.

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FITZ STOPS RULLIN

RED-HAIRED WONDER OF THE PUGILISTIC WORLD WHIPS AKRON GIANT

KNOCKED OUT GUS IN THE SIXTH

FITZ HAD BEST OF IT THROUGHOUT AND THE END CAME QUICKLY

RULLIN MAKES NO EXCUSE

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—Bob Fitzsimmons, of Australia, but now an American citizen, met Gus Rullin, the Akron giant, tonight, before the Twentieth Century club at Madison Square Garden, and won by knocking the Ohioan down and out in the sixth round.

Before the fight and in some weeks past there have been many rumors to the effect that Fitzsimmons was too old to cope with his younger opponent.

ENTERING THE RING.

When the men entered the ring Fitzsimmons was enveloped in a light colored bath robe. Underneath this he wore pink knitted tights, supported by a belt made of small American flags fastened at the side with a red, white and blue rosette.

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ROBERT PENNINGTON EXPRESS

The Messenger Killed in His Car on the Run From Cincinnati to Columbus.

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 10.—The passenger train on the Pennsylvania line due to arrive from the west at midnight, was robbed at some point between here and Cincinnati tonight and Messenger Charles Lane, of this city, was killed.

The messenger was found dead in the car with a bullet in his head. A safe had been blown open and all the valuables taken.

The murder and robbery is supposed to have taken place between Milford Center and Columbus, as no harm had befallen the express messenger when the train stopped there. The messenger was alone.

When extra Messenger J. M. Sheldon, who assists Robert Mulligan, agent for the Adams Express company at the Union station, went to the door of express car No. 812, which had just pulled in from St. Louis and Indianapolis, he unlocked the door as usual and shoved it back in a horrible sight met his gaze.

Lying flat on his face and in a pool of his own blood, lay the messenger. His head was lying just between the edge of the stove and the edge of the door in the forward end of the car.

There was some delay in finding Coroner Birmingham. A careful examination revealed eight bullet wounds. Three of them were in the right side of the back, about eight inches below the shoulder.

One was in the left side, six inches above the hip bone. Four were in and about the calf of the right leg. Two bullets were visible under the skin of the breast.

These were extracted and were found to be of 38 caliber. One bullet, lying about two feet away from the body was lying on the face in the ear, and another was found near the right foot, lying about two feet away from the body.

The train was in charge of Conductor Jerry Taylor, who took it out of St. Louis. At Milford Center Mr. Lane and his car were all right, for Mr. Taylor had a conversation with him at the point. One report is that \$5,000 in money was secured by the robbers.
