AGUINALDO IS WARY.

Refused to Take Advantage of the Amnesty Proclamation. WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Copies of Manila papers received at the war department contain a letter purporting to be from Aguinaldo to the president, in which he states that the Filipino chief does not take advantage of the amnesty proclamation because, some time ago, he gave orders to his followers to break up into guerrilla bands. The amnesty order excepts those who violated the laws of warfare, and the letter states that Aguinaldo fears that he would be in the expected class should he surrender.

MOVEMENTS OF THE BOERS.

Barbecton Is Now the Capital of the Transvaal Government. LONDON, Aug. 13.—The Boers have left Machadoodorp, according to the Lourenço Marques correspondent of the Daily Mail, and are now in the neighborhood of Barbecton. A considerable portion of Commandant General Lourenço's stores at Dalmanthus was destroyed by fire on Sunday.

DEATHS OF A DAY.

NEW YORK, Aug. 13.—Phillips H. Morgan, former United States minister to Mexico, died in this city today as a result of a heart attack. He was seventy-five years old. Mr. Morgan was born in Baltimore, Md., and was prominent socially and politically in Baltimore for many years. During recent years he has been engaged in the practice of law in New York city.

GERMAN PLAYWRIGHT DEAD.

BERLIN, Aug. 13.—Carl Lufs, the well known playwright, died yesterday at his residence in Berlin. He was seventy-two years old. Lufs was one of the most prominent playwrights of the German stage. He wrote many plays, including "The Blue Bird" and "The Song of the Lark".

TELEGRAPHS ARE RECOGNIZED.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Aug. 13.—After several conferences with the Baltimore & Ohio railway officials the Order of Railroad Telegraphers has been recognized by the majority of the 2,600 or more operators employed on the Baltimore & Ohio system. In some instances the advance will be between \$5 and \$10 a month.

WATER BOARD.

Conference Committee Acts on Complaint of Fire Department.
