MINNESOTA TRANSFER COMPANY WILL SWITCH CARS FOR TWENTY-FIVE CENTS

COMPANIES WITHIN LIMITS

Outside Industries Will Be Charged Higher Rates—Meeting Was Attended by Railroad and Commercial Men.

A meeting of the directors of the Minnesota Transfer company and the several municipal commercial organizations was held at the Omaha road yesterday, which resulted in the restoration of the former rate of 25 cents for switching cars by the transfer company at the transfer station.

President Pennington, of the transfer company, presided at the meeting. Comptroller Robinson, of the Omaha, was the secretary, and the following railroad representatives and members of the transfer company were present: W. P. Clough, Great Northern; E. D. Sewall, Milwaukee; S. C. Stickney, Great Western; George P. Lyman, Burlington; J. P. Baird, Northern Pacific; W. A. Scott, Omaha. All the commercial clubs of the city had representatives present.

Washington and Oregon—Cutting and threshing of grain general throughout all districts. Weather quite favorable. Yields in most districts not turning out as well as expected.

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 16.—The Confederate Association of the Army of the Tennessee, which includes a large majority of the Confederate veterans in New Orleans, at a meeting here, has protested against the proposed bill to amend the United Confederate Veterans, commanding Gen. A. R. Encampment, Chicago.

As to the proposition that the Confederate veterans issue a circular reply to Gen. Shaw's recent remarks at Atlanta, the bill is being considered by the United Confederate Veterans. Insisted that Shaw's remarks should be treated with contempt, but contended that Gen. Gordon should be censured for taking part in such meetings, and for having accepted an invitation to attend a similar meeting to take place.

Gen. Chaloner offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted: "In view of the recent occurrences at Atlanta, and the utterances there of the commander of the city in relation to the so-called reunions of the blue and the gray, and protests against Gen. John B. Gordon accepting an invitation to be present at the reunion of the United Confederate Veterans, in his capacity as the commander of the United Confederate Veterans."
