

LAW AVENGES MURDER OF GOEBEL

Caleb Powers, Former Republican Secretary of State, Found Guilty of Complicity

The Jury Sentences Him to Imprisonment for Life—A Good Deal of Feeling Over the Result.

GEORGETOWN, Ky., Aug. 18.—The jury, after a deliberation of five and a half hours, returned its verdict at 2:25, having been out only fifty-three minutes.

During the presentation of the case by Mr. Franklin, Defendant Powers sat as usual with his counsel. His face did not change color as the attorney went through the evidence and held up to the jury the most important points against the defendant.

POWERS AND YOUTSEY.

Replying to the charge of the defense that the evidence had failed to connect Powers with Youtsey, Franklin approached the prisoner and with dramatic gestures and manner said:

LEXINGTON, Aug. 18.—Senator J. C. Blackburn being told of the Powers verdict, exclaimed: "Thank God for that. I had expected a hung jury. I believed three men on that jury at least would hang it."

PORTO RICAN THIEF CAUGHT.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—The state department today received a dispatch from Ambassador Porter at Paris stating that Jose Castro Garcia, a fugitive from justice from Porto Rico, had landed at Havre; had confessed to the charge of embezzling public funds, and had consented to extradition.


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ARMORED ASSAULT ON THE SHAH OF PERSIA

PLOT TO KILL MCKINLEY

FOURTEEN ANARCHISTS REPORTED TO BE UNDER DETENTION IN NEW YORK

PLOT HATCHED AT NAPLES

It Is Said That They Were to Attack the President Simultaneously in Order to Insure Success.

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—The Evening World today prints the following relative to news received from Washington yesterday of the detention at the barge office in this city by secret service agents of Notable Maresca and Michell Welda, supposed anarchists, who arrived yesterday on the Kaiser Wilhelm II.

HOW IT STARTED.

"The conspiracy was made on a night early in August. By working with the Italian police the secret service agents got wind of a great meeting of the circle in Naples. The men selected for the work in this country were quickly notified, what they were to do, separated, going singly or in pairs to different parts in Europe. Some went to France, others to Germany, while still others crossed the channel to England. Step by step they were followed to the gang-plank of steamers.

HOW IT STARTED.

"The fourteen are now detained by the immigration authorities and are either at the barge office at the Battery or the detention quarters at quarantine. "One report is to the effect that some are in Ludlow street jail, having been taken there from Ellis Island in order to thwart any attempt to rescue them by Patterson anarchists."

"So far as known, according to the Evening World, the plan was for each man to proceed to Washington at once on a certain day. They were to surround the president and await an opportunity to strike. The low was to be by a pistol and knife. One of the number, it was certain, would be successful. The question of escape was not considered, the men being willing to sacrifice their lives for their principles. The two men who did not meet their fellow anarchists were Maresca and Welda. Chief Wilkie of the secret service division of the treasury department, had his agents at the pier when the steamer docked. The two men did not come in the steerage, as did the others. Maresca came as a steward in the steerage and Welda as a coal passer. They could have landed without going through the formality of the barge office.

LI HUNG ADMITS CAPTURE OF PEKIN

Powers Are Now Engaged in Discussing the Next Move of the Allies.

Losses Before Pekin Were Heavy but Have Not Yet Been Ascertained Here.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—Mr. Wu, the Chinese minister, tonight received an official cablegram announcing the entry of the allied forces into Pekin on the night of the 15th.

It was sent by Li Hung Chang and transmitted to Minister Wu by the Chinese minister in London.

The text of the dispatch was not given out, but it was explained that the message was a similar announcement from the Chinese government of dispatches reporting the fall of the Chinese capital.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—The government, now fully satisfied by the advice in hand today that the international troops have entered Pekin, and that the legations are saved, is calmly awaiting detailed statements from its own officers on the ground.

The president, Secretary Root, Acting Secretary of State McAdee, Acting Secretary of the Navy Hackett and other officials were in conference during the afternoon.

AN ADJUSTMENT PROBABLE. The general situation at Shanghai, caused by the proposed landing of British troops and the protests of Germany and France, continues to be strained, although the authorities are rather more hopeful of satisfactory adjustment than heretofore.

THE GOVERNMENT'S POLICY.

The general policy of the government toward China heretofore has been made known to Gen. Chaffee and Minister Conger, and it was stated authoritatively tonight that there was no necessity of sending these officials additional instructions on the subject.

YAMAGUCHI'S ACCOUNT.

The dispatch from Gen. Yamaguchi giving the details of the capture of Pekin, was accepted by the war department officials as giving the most satisfactory account thus far received.

Even with the Chinese capital occupied by the allied forces, it is realized that there is still serious business for the forces inside the city. While they have breached the outer walls, which encircle the entire city, yet there are walls within the city, and it remains to be seen whether an attempt will be made to enter the imperial city, forming a distinct section of Pekin proper.

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SHANGHAI THE CRUCIAL SPOT.

London Authorities Inclined to Believe That Trouble May Erupt.

LONDON, Aug. 19.—Whatever of interest might attach to the events reported in the night dispatches is obscured by the capture of Pekin, as most of the messages relate to matters preceding and leading up to the capture of the capital.

Gen. Lnevitch, commander of the Russian troops in Pe Chi Li, reports to St. Petersburg that on Aug. 12 the Chinese intended to give battle at the Sin, where were concentrated the Chinese forces, the best Manchurian troops, commanded by Gen. Tung Fuh Siang, but that, losing courage, they retreated hurriedly, not waiting for an attack by the Russian troops.

PATROLLING THE YANGTZE.

All the Powers to Assist in Relieving Great Britain. WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—As the result of an exchange of cablegrams between the powers, concerning affairs at Shanghai, an agreement has been reached by which all the admirals of the several powers represented at Shanghai, will get concurrently in a survey, or watching, of the Chinese Yangtze river.

CASUALTIES WERE HEAVY.

Gen. Yamaguchi Lost 100 Men at Pekin—Allies Loss Unknown. TOKIO, Aug. 17.—Gen. Yamaguchi wires from Pekin, under date of Aug. 16, as follows:

The allies attacked Pekin early yesterday, opening with artillery on the eastern side. The wall was obstinately held by the enemy. The Japanese and British were on the northward of the Tung Chow canal. The American and British were on the south side. At nightfall, the Japanese blew up the two eastern gates of the Tartar city and entered. In the meantime, the Americans and British entered the Chinese city by the Tang Fish gates. Detachments of each force were sent towards the legations.

PROMOTION FOR CHAFFEE.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—The prominence which Gen. Chaffee has attained in the China campaign has already started some discussion as to a suitable reward to him by promotion in the regular army. There seems to be no question but that he will get the next vacancy among the brigadier generals of the regular army and some of his friends in the war department talk of still higher honors for him and indicate that it is quite possible he will be selected for major general when the next vacancy occurred. If this was done, he would be promoted over the heads of the present list of brigadier generals. Gen. Chaffee is member of the Eighth cavalry, but a major general of volunteers.
