HARD COAL VERY HIGH

THE RETAIL PRICE HAS ALREADY CLIMBED TO \$2.5 A TON.

The price of anthracite coal in the Twin Cities took another hop, skip and jump yesterday and landed at the retail market at \$2.50 a ton, an advance which prevailed in the country, and was arranged on the basis of 50 cents in Chicago, the prevailing price in the West.

As a matter of fact there is still a considerable quantity of coal to be delivered to consumers at the prices that prevailed prior to the strike. The winter supply of anthracite is almost exclusively for domestic purposes and is largely contracted for at certain prices before the winter sets in.

The small dealers in the country towns who feel the advance in price more than any one else in making contracts with them the Minneapolis jobbers contract to deliver coal during the winter at certain prices, which are based on the price of the country merchant. This reservation usually is made in contracts with individual parties, and is entirely for domestic use.

That there are small prospects of suffering through a local coal famine is indicated by the fact that only about 100,000 tons of coal are mined in Minnesota this city in a year. These figures may sound large to a layman, but to the man who has to fuel his furnace and the popularity with which it can be burned they are very small. A dealer points out that he has several customers who use more than 100,000 tons of coal annually.

Bad results in the coal shortage will be much more apparent in the East than in the West. Approximately about 50,000,000 tons of coal are mined in the East in the anthracite region, and only about 10,000,000 tons are shipped west of Buffalo. She Tells What She Knows of the Rudt Affair.
