DIVIDED AS TO THE DARK

WOMEN AT FEDERATED CLUBS' CO-VENTION FAIL TO TAKE POSITIVE ACTION

PAPERS TREATED IT LIGHTLY

This Some of the Delegates Considered a Serious Matter—Minneapolis Lumbermen Supposed to Be in the Background.

DULUTH, Oct. 4.—(Special.)—The club women who could gather themselves together in time went, according to programme, on a visit to the Duluth high school this morning. Everybody was on the qui-vive for the discussion which had been set for the morning session, but the interest of the visit was sufficient to hold them ten minutes over time, so that the park question was not taken up until 9:45.

Then there was the liveliest sizzling in the heat of the line, and the editorial and news article in the morning paper, ridiculing the park scheme and declaring that Minneapolis and St. Paul lumbermen were using the women for political purposes (how was not made clear), had strung the adherents and promoters up for a lively time. The news article referred to closed with the remark that "when the park scheme is laid away in its little grave a number of St. Paul and Minneapolis business men will drink large buckets to the truth of the saying that 'there's a sucker born every minute.'"—an exordium which was as delicately complimentary to the women favoring the project as it was lucidly explanatory of the way in which their action was serving the political purposes of the St. Paul and Minneapolis business men.

Mr. J. H. Schroeder, of Duluth, opened the discussion and explained the position as one wholly favorable to a national park, but hostile to the selection of that particular place. She regretted that the Federation had taken the stand it had with reference to the matter, believing that so important a matter, a matter involving such large interests, should have had fuller and freer discussion and that in this case the evidence of political coloring should have kept the Federation aloof therefrom.

It was agreed by the house that each speaker should be allowed three minutes until the hour was up. When Mrs. M. R. Baldwin, wife of the former Indian commissioner, took the floor it was evident that she was the opposition trump card as dozens of them were on their feet asking permission to yield to her. Her three minutes were not only used, but she, as they could not all have spoken. Mrs. Baldwin came armed with facts and figures and letters and maps. Her object was to show that the success of the park scheme would work to the benefit of the Indians, who are averse to the park, but she contended that the Indians could not live under the conditions which the park would make inevitable; that they had expressed themselves as hostile to it, and had gone so far as to make a strike against it. She contended that the park plan was approved, Mrs. Baldwin cited authorities to prove that one-half of the land not allotted to the Indians was to be sold to the white settlers, and that the rest would be sold to the white settlers, whom she claims the Indians want in the park, and the added means of support their presence would afford the men. Here, after a shower of questions and "rising to points of order," and the presentation of a half dozen or so more, "the order of business" was called to order, and the speaker left the question as it bore upon the Indian and "right from the shoulder" put this question to the convention: "Your authorities on forestry have admitted that good agricultural land should not be devoted to tree growing. Why are you recommending the park plan, which is so much rich and highly marketable land, lying between Duluth and the Red river valley, should be devoted to a forestry park, thus shutting off our city from one of the most fertile valleys in the state?"

The question brought not an answer, but another question which shifted the subject back to the Indian question. James, of St. Paul, after some difficulty in getting past this ubiquitous and thorny point of order, gained the floor and asked: "When this agricultural land is opened to white settlers, then what will happen to the Indian?"

"He will be protected in his rights by the government," was the answer. "Has government protection heretofore been for against white man's infringement of a national park than by a group of settlers?"

"The government has been taught a lesson in the result of trifling with the Indians, which will be effective."

"The only guarantee which we offer the red man is that, though we have been bad in the past, we will be good in the future," concluded the speaker.

Mrs. Rankin, of Minneapolis, was interrupted in her remarks favoring the park, on the ground that she was becoming personable when she referred to "Minneapolis lumbermen." Mrs. Rankin replied that she was only endeavoring to probe the insinuations contained in the morning paper, but begged the pardon of the convention if her remarks had been offensive.

Mrs. W. S. Woodbridge, of Duluth, dropped a miniature bomb into the convention when she rose and in her gentle, soothingly worded remarks, which were from Bishop Whipple, whose love for the Indian could not be called in question, and he, in this letter, favored the establishment of a state school of forestry, which she called the "Farmer's" school, and continued, "permit me to say that the papers and the opposition speakers on the floor of this house do not represent the sentiment of all the women of Duluth, and I think it is only fair to the reputation of the city to say that those who favored the park were unable to get a word into the papers expressive of their sentiments, and therefore it appears that the whole city of Duluth is against the proposed park—an impression which is false."

In the midst of the stir which followed this speech the president called time, and with skill and tact led the convention back into the channels of the regular programme. The discussion following Mrs. J. W. Morrison's paper urging the establishment of a state school of forestry, was postponed for later time, and the delegates proceeded to the routine business, chief of which was the forming of a committee to investigate the matter of the proposed park. The result was made Mrs. W. B. Mitchell, of St. Cloud, vice-president-at-large; Mrs. W. F. Graves, corresponding secretary; and Mrs. E. G. Butts, of Stillwater, treasurer. These were all the officers up for election this year.

The work of nominating chairmen and members of 22 standing committees to carry on the year's work took no little time, and the only other matters of importance which came up was the recommendation from the library committee to work for the library bill to be brought before the legislature. This bill will make the library boards in small towns elective instead of appointive.

The chief features of the afternoon's and evening's programme were the papers on "Relation of Art to Manufacturing," by Mrs. W. Little, of Winona; "The Relation of Art to Life," by Miss Lily Long, of St. Paul; "The Economy of Reserve," by Mrs. G. O. Welch, of Fergus Falls; and "The Permanent Results of Literary Study," by Mrs. Charles Morris, of Berlin, Wisconsin.

The remains of Mrs. Jane Lehmkuhl will arrive here from Newport this afternoon, and the interment will occur in Fairview cemetery. Short services will be conducted at the grave by Rev. Palmer, of Ascension Episcopal church. The Hofbrau club was entertained last evening at the hospitable home of Aid. Mark J. Schroeder. It was a pleasant affair, and was largely enjoyed. L. C.
