Report of Board of Prison Managers Shows the Exact Results of Its Operation Last Year

Balance Sheet of the Twine Plant Shows a Profit for the Year of \$16,000, Figuring the Raw Material on Hand at Lower Than Market Prices.

Gov. Lind yesterday received the annual report of the managers, warden and other officials of the state prison at Stillwater, showing in detail all of the operations of that institution for the year ending Aug. 31 last.

We have the honor to submit to you, the legislature, this the eleventh biennial report for the period beginning Feb. 1, 1899, and ending Aug. 31, 1900.

PRISON INDUSTRIES. The character of the institution during the past two years, work has been done for all able bodied inmates in the twine and shoe factories, and the several departments of the institution.

RELIGIOUS WORK. The religious work of the institution receives that care and attention which is due to the souls of the inmates.

PRISON SCHOOL. The prison school has been well attended and the scholars have made good progress in their studies.

INSANE CRIMINALS. We believe it is our duty, as guardians of the public peace, to call attention to the fact that the present arrangement for the treatment of insane criminals is not satisfactory.

REFORMATORY METHODS. While the results of the parole law have been satisfactory, as will be seen by a perusal of the report.

IMPROVEMENTS. During the past season the last of the buildings used by the thrasher company have been removed.

FIRST DISTRICT CONGRESSMAN NOW ADMITS HE ATTENDED THE WEST HOTEL MEETING

NOT AS AN ASTRAL BODY

BOWS TO THE PROOFS OF HIS PRES- ENCE, AND TELLS WHY HE ATTENDED

EARLE YOUNG'S SENSATION

Former Partner of F. Weyerhaeuser and Constituent of Tawney, Condemns the Lumber Tariff as Unnecessary.

WINONA, Oct. 18.—(Special.)—Congressman James A. Tawney, of this city, has at length admitted that he attended that West hotel conference of lumber barons and not as an astral body, but in his own right.

The sensation of today in this city is an article which appeared this morning in the Winona Independent, the morning daily with Republican leanings, from one of Mr. Tawney's lumberman "constituents."

CONDEMNNS THE TARIFF.

The signed communication of Mr. Young, who is a retired gentleman of wealth and high social standing, and a Republican in his political affiliations, condemns the tariff on lumber as unnecessary, a tax upon the consumer, and a source of unlawful wealth to the manufacturer and holder of pine stumpage.

"I WOULD PREFER NOT TO INTERVIEW, OR MIX UP IN THIS DISCUSSION."

"I would prefer not to interview, or mix up in this discussion," read Mr. Young's article in the morning papers, and I do not know if he has anything to say in regard to it by way of criticism or otherwise.

"DID YOU CONSIDER THE \$2 DUTY ON LUMBER NECESSARY TO THE PROTECTION OF THE MINNESOTA LUMBERMAN, MR. HORTON?"

"As to the \$2 duty on lumber, I favored it myself. I thought the \$1 duty in the Wilson and McKinley bills enough. All we needed was tariff enough to offset the cost of labor here, and I thought between here and Canada, and \$1 I thought was enough."

"IS IT TRUE, MR. HORTON, AS CHARGED BY MR. YOUNG, THAT YOU, AS A MEMBER OF THE CONGRESSMAN TO WHOM THE LUMBERMAN OF THE COUNTRY CHIEFLY LOOKED TO PUT THROUGH THE \$2 DUTY?"

"Well, I do not know that I could say that Mr. Tawney was more influential and active for the lumber interest, than some other congressmen. For example, there is members from Dubuque, who was in charge of half of the down river lumber interests."

"BUT AS TO MINNESOTA, WHO WAS THE ACTIVE REPRESENTATIVE OF THE LUMBER INTEREST?"

"Oh, naturally Mr. Tawney. He was the man of course that the Minnesota lumber interests looked to take care of them in Washington."

"THAT MAY BE, BUT I COULD STATE POSITIVELY IN REGARD TO MR. NELSON."

"That may be, but I could state positively in regard to Mr. Nelson."

"COUNTRY DOESN'T NEED IT."

"Speaking of the necessity of a high tariff in general, Mr. Horton expressed himself as follows:

"THE TIME IS UNDOUBTEDLY PASSED WHEN THIS COUNTRY NEEDS THE HIGH TARIFF IT USED TO REQUIRE."

"The time is undoubtedly past when this country needs the high tariff it used to require. We are an exporting nation, and do not need to fear foreign competition. I do not mean to say that I am a free trader, but that a high tariff is not necessary to protect our interests."
