Charles Donahue, of New Richmond, Wis., who has been spending some time in Alaska, has returned home and is spending a day or two in this city. Donahue does not seem very encouragingly of the Klondike region, and says that, although a few people strike it rich, far more are scarcely able to get out of the territory.

Republican primaries were held last night in the various city precincts, and delegates were chosen to attend the city convention to be held today. Although a number of candidates for mayor have been mentioned, there seems to be no concerted movement in favor of any particular candidate. E. G. Foster is again a candidate for city treasurer, and there is a warm fight on between Mr. Foster, W. T. Perrie and Samuel Bloomer.

A delegation of Stillwater Republicans went to St. Paul last evening to attend a rally. Among the number were the uniformed Republican clubs of the city. Democratic primaries are also to be held in the city this evening, and delegates will be selected to attend the city convention to be held next Monday. There is a strong feeling among Democrats in favor of renominating Mayor J. G. Armon for that office, but Mr. Armon has for some time declined to accept a second term. Some Republicans are also in favor of renominating Mr. Armon, and claim they will do everything they can to keep the Republican party from nominating a man for mayor, provided Mr. Armon will consent to run again on the Democratic ticket.

HAZELTON, Pa., Oct. 19.—As far as the officials of the United Mine Workers are concerned, matters are at a standstill in the miners' contest with the operators. There is nothing new in the situation today and President Mitchell still refuses to discuss the matter. Disappointment was expressed in this region today that an early settlement of the strike was prevented by reason of the powder disagreement. Some say the union officials are not authorized by the Scranton convention to decide the powder question, and another convention of miners will be necessary to dispose of the question. A number of miners are insistent upon an acceptance by the operators, without powder reduction being considered in the advance. When asked what the miners would do if the operators refused to accede to this concession a labor leader said the contest would continue until the operators gave in. When it was suggested that the miners might be a break in the ranks of the strikers before the operators would weaken, he expressed the utmost confidence in the loyalty of the men in the entire region.
