## RIGHTS OF THE WITNESS

THEY ARE PASSED UPON IN A DECISION BY THE SUPREME COURT

### GRAND JURY CONDEMNS JAIL

It Is Held to Be Unsafe, and Immediate Repairs Are Recommended by the Inquisitors.

Several decisions were handed down by the supreme court yesterday. In the case of the Pipestone County Bank of Pipestone City, respondent, vs. Albert L. Ward and Charles Ward, his wife, appellants, in which the order of the lower court was reversed, the facts are as follows:

Defendant Hansberg owned a mill at Pipestone, which he sold to Defendant Ward. He received \$2,000 cash. Hansberg and wife then executed to the Martin County bank their notes in the sum of \$4,000 and a mortgage to secure the same. The property was then conveyed to Ward, subject to the mortgage. In the action commenced it developed that Defendant Hansberg transferred the mortgage as collateral security for \$2,000.

Following is the syllabus: In an action to foreclose a mortgage which had been assigned to plaintiff as collateral security, such assignor is a party for whose immediate benefit the action is prosecuted, and he may be called for cross-examination under G. S. 1894, section 5653. Order reversed.

In the matter of the application of the Minneapolis & St. Louis railroad, for the appointment of commissioners to condemn certain lands in Martin county, Minnesota, Minneapolis & St. Louis Railroad Company appellant, vs. Erick Olson and Ingrid Olson. Following is the syllabus:

In condemnation proceedings in furtherance of a proposed extension of its road by a railroad company organized under the laws of this state, the power to exercise the right of eminent domain, the limits of the proposed extension not being included within its charter or articles of incorporation, section 2749, G. S. 1894, applies, and a compliance with its terms is necessary to confer jurisdiction of the subject matter in such proceedings. Such fact being shown, the court may modify its order appointing commissioners by vacating the same and denying the application. Order affirmed.

In the case of Germania Bank of Minneapolis, respondent, vs. C. G. Osborne, appellant, order was reversed and a new trial granted.

Following is the syllabus: In an action upon a promissory note to which a counter claim was pleaded, to the effect that the note was given in pursuance of a parol agreement for the sale of certificates of bank stock by plaintiff to defendant, upon the condition that defendant might at his option resell them to plaintiff in consideration of the surrender of the note, the condition that plaintiff might at his option resell them, and did not tend to change the terms of the note. Order reversed and a new trial granted.

In the case of Solomon B. Taylor, respondent, vs. City of Mankato, appellant, in which order was affirmed yesterday, the syllabus is as follows:

One who, while traveling along a public thoroughfare in the suburbs of a city, on a dark night, with knowledge of a defect in the sidewalk, leaves the road and takes the walk and is injured by falling into the opening which he is trying to avoid, is not, as a matter of law, guilty of contributory negligence. Order affirmed.

W. E. Ingals, appellant, vs. Nels Holmgren, respondent. Opinion per curiam. A verdict having been returned for defendant in the case below, plaintiff moved for a new trial on two grounds:

First—That the verdict of the jury was not justified by the evidence, and is contrary to law.

Second—For errors in law occurring at the trial, and excepted to by the plaintiff. The motion for a new trial was denied and plaintiff appealed.

The only assignment of error is as follows: The court erred in refusing plaintiff a new trial. Order affirmed.

Lilly Is in a Hurry. If the commitment papers are ready Sheriff Wagner will take Fred J. Lilly to Stillwater to enter upon a five-year sentence for the attempted murder of his wife and Della Zellner.

Lilly has informed the sheriff that the reported dangerous condition of the jail makes him feel nervous and he would feel safe until out of it. Mike O'Brien and Sanford, seven light sentences on charges of larceny, were taken to Stillwater Wednesday.
